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Subject has contacted Jina Mary BRODILLINI, who agreed to assist the Japs in the location of certain Chinese Guerilla units, operating in the Settlement or the French Concession, by pretending to supply them with arms and ammunition. Subject has been known to boast that he was a former "Chicago gangster", in order to solicit the good graces of the Jap Secret Service Section. His contacts include Rudolph MAYER, Captain Yoshinobu KUWAHATA, a Mr. NISHITABEI, I. OKMURA, and a Mrs. NAGAMI; subject is also associated with Otto BOISSERIE, AND George HOSHINOYA. He has been known to try to claim American citizenship, saying that he was born in Bay City, Michigan; is known to be a generally bad egg, wholly unscrupulous, frequently seen drunk and armed, and defying either Frenchtown or Settlement to arrest him; carries a special Jap passport. Other relatives include a brother-in-law. Of Mrs. GUREVITCH - a Mr. GUREVITCH, who owns and operates the Shobur Pharmacy, Avenue Joffre, Shanghai; and E. LVOFF, proprietor of Regal Pharmacy, Bubbling Well Road, Shanghai.

13. CHISHOLM, Robert - (@ Don CHISHOLM) Subject is about 38 years old, reliably reported to have been born in Baltimore, Md., the son of a Dean at (John?) Hopkins University, who died in 1925. Subject's brother, Jack CHISHOLM, is known to have lived in Baltimore. Records reveal that subject was arrested in San Francisco, on 9-24-26, as a fugitive, having been wanted in Washington (8-10-28), charged with grand larceny, arrested again in Sacramento on 10-29-28, enroute to New York for felony, and wanted in New York City, 10-18-28, for larceny. Subject's former wife, Marion Beatrice KEIFER, has broadcast from Berlin for the Germans, although, according to her mother, Mrs. Henry DIECKMANN, of Mt. Eden, California, her last known address was Madrid; she divorced subject in 1937. Subject is now known to be a newspaperman in Shanghai; has published a weekly scandal-sheet called the "Shopping News", which, even before Pearl Harbor, fretted the British community with nasty remarks and implications. Subject claims that 99% of all Americans in Shanghai duplicate his feelings for the British, who are noted for their "arrogance, greedyness, and ill-concealed contempt for Americans". Subject served in the American Navy in British waters during the last war, and is now looked upon by Americans as an A-1 traitor. From December 3, '41 at least until June, 1942, and probably much later, he broadcast nightly over Station XMHA, Shanghai, long and short wave, with anti-British sentiment rampant, and pro-Jap sympathy apparent.

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CHISHOLM, Robert (cont'd)

He was interned in the Bridge House in the spring of 1943; given the "silent treatment" by fellow-Americans there, he finally broke down and tried to convince others that the Japs had forced him to read news from Domei, Transocena, Fass, Havas, Reuters, and Stephanie agencies, and take over Carroll ALCOTT's newscasts; says he gained permission to delete all objectionable copy. It is said that he has instructed the Press Bureau to turn over his \$2000 monthly salary to the American Civilian Relief Ass'n. Subsequently released from internment, an action which renewed rumors that he was a stool-pigeon, he suffered a possibly intentional fall downstairs, with reports at variance as to the extent of his injuries. Some say that his back was fractured, others that several ribs were broken; in any event, he has spent weeks in the cast, possibly thru an agreement with the attending physician, to avoid further contacts with the Japs. It is said that he has since applied for puppet Chinese citizenship, and may have resumed his broadcasts. His current wife is Russian.

16. MOY, Herbert - (MOY, Herbert Erasmus) American-born Chinese, of late 1943, chief broadcaster and commentator on the German radio station XGRS, Shanghai, SINCE THE OUTBREAK OF THE war, but formerly operated the Evening Post station. Some ten years ago, subject was employed for a year in the New York bureau of United Press. He has renounced his American citizenship, and his comments are powerfully anti-American, anti-British, and pro-Axis, although he has been said to speak with sincerity and conviction, claiming to be sympathetic to the Chinese, and refusing to have any dealings with the Nanking factions. It is believed that the Germans have issued 'safe conduct' papers to him, in lieu of an actual Nazi passport. He writes his own argumentative material, and is given considerable leeway to say what he please, aping Goebbels in his writing. Is reported, in November, 1941, as having formerly written for the pro-Axis magazine "Shanghai Calling", whose editor was Dr. Klaus MEHNERT; this magazine was issued by the German Far Eastern Radio Station XGRS, and appeared in Hawaii and California. It is suggested that subject may now be involved in the publication of "Freedom", Jap Shanghai propaganda vehicle.

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
