

1. On 23 February 1946, more than 10,000 Russian troops of mixed infantry, C-3 and artillery, moved from Yenchi (129-33, 42-56) to Kirin City (126-36, 43-53). On the same night approximately 5,000 infantry and 10,000 artillery troops advanced to Heihoku (125-41, 42-32), while the others were all stationed in the Peitaying barracks and the ex-Southern Manchurian Railroad Administration building in Kirin. These troops are commanded by Major Yayichi (Chinese rendering of name), Commander of the garrison forces in Kirin City, and under the jurisdiction of General OKOLOFF, Commander of all Russian military forces in the Kirin District.

2. Russian headquarters and the largest concentration of troops is at F-3 Manchouli (117-27, 49-36). There are forces at Tsitsihar (123-57, 47-22), Hailar (119-44, 49-13), Chalantun (122-45, 48-01), Tannan (?), Chentung (123-15, 45-50) and Yangyangchi (?).

3. The 54,000 Russian troops in this area are of the following branches: F-3 (approximate figures)
