REFERENCE : Your buckslip attached to original of EGBA-10908

These are the salient issues:

1. Berlin for quite a long time has pressed for DTLINEN to have a Bonn representative. This request was initiated at a time when Tillich (not Henard as you indicated) was running somewhat wild and had not been sufficiently controlled by us. Since that time Tillich's wings have been clipped considerably; we have made our control over him stick; relations between DTLINEN and the FedRep (Dellingshausen/ Liaison) have improved and further cleared the atmosphere.

2. Some time after the Dellingshausen Liaison had shown the improved relations between DTLINEN and the FedRep, Berlin renewed its request for a Bonn office. At that time this matter was discussed with DCOM and it was felt that there were no objections in principle to the establishment of a Bonn office provided we knew precisely who would head it, what the individual's contacts would be and what his function would be. These considerations prompted me to ask Berlin for more detailed information, which is contained in the attached dispatch, the enclosure thereto and attached note on Hermann von Hirschheydt, who is the individual referred to.

3. I consider the dispatch satisfactory and can see no reason why a Bonn office should not be established at this time, especially since we have on record a policy providing for the eventual turn-over of DTLINEN and CADROIT to the Germans. (CADROIT already has a Bonn liaison office).

4. In light of the above I would appreciate your giving further consideration to this matter. Perhaps a brief session between DCOM, yourself and D/G could be arranged, settling this matter once and for all. (I am specifically interested in furnishing definitive guidance to Berlin at an early date.)

1. NEWHAM submitted additional information regarding your questions in Paragraph 1 of Reference. This pertains to the functions which the Bonn representative will carry out, but for obvious reasons does not include a blow-by-blow description of his daily activities.
2. The Bonn office will be a bona fide DTLINEN installation. It will be staffed by Subject cited in Paragraph 1A, EGBA-5009, and his wife. NEWHAM considers the representative's tasks as threefold: (a) develop and maintain friendly contact with Bundestag and Bundesrat representatives, government functionaries, and press representatives; (b) serve as the on-the-scene spokesman for DTLINEN matters which in some manner must be referred to government offices (a recent example was the negotiation re transfer of search service cards to the German Red Cross); at the same time he can answer inquiries and requests of government functionaries, or, if unable to do so, can expedite these to NEWHAM and us; (c) act as the DTLINEN representative at social, semi-official and official events sponsored by government offices and organizations to which DTLINEN has been tendered an invitation. As a fourth task he will be expected to report the trend of political developments in Bonn to NEWHAM and through him to us. The representative will be specifically instructed not to engage in negotiations of a policy nature without specific approval and concurrence by NEWHAM, who gets his policy guidance from us.
3. In order to subject the Bonn representative to maximum KUBARK control, we informed NEWHAM that we expected one of our representatives to establish and maintain periodic contact with the Bonn designee. NEWHAM agreed with our proposal and stated it was an excellent arrangement for passing policy guidance and instructions to the representative whenever an urgent need for doing so arose. There is no need to belabor the advantages of having a senior case officer in direct contact with the Bonn representative. [] suggested [] as the logical person to handle this particular assignment and we concur in the suggestion. Irrespective of who is designated, it should be a person fully conversant in German who is thoroughly familiar with the political climate in Bonn. After the initial introduction to the Bonn representative has been accomplished, he can make his own arrangements re further contacts. We think that the initial introduction can best be handled in Berlin and it might be necessary for our representative to come to Berlin for a day or two.
