The case officer took the opportunity over lunch at the 6 July 1960 contact with CARAVEL to bring up again the matter of Reinhard DULLIEN and his relations with as well as his threat to CARAVEL. CARAVEL again remarked that he had not yet seen any indication that DULLIEN had succeeded in establishing either in CAMEW or in the Ministry any influences which would work to the disadvantage of CARAVEL, as was indicated by <input type="checkbox"/> nor did he expect to see any....</p> <p>3. CARAVEL explained further that, although DULLIEN's appointment to office was not a political matter, his removal would be one, and despite the fact that both von LEX and TOKA would like to replace DULLIEN, there appeared simply no grounds upon which it could be done without creating more unpleasantness than the change would be worth to the Government. DULLIEN's incompetence would of course be sufficient grounds, but for the Government which appointed him to remove him on such grounds would be too embarrassing. Nevertheless, CARAVEL assures the case officer that DULLIEN's stock where it counts, in the Ministry, is at zero, and he is therefore powerless to injure CARAVEL so long as the CDU is running things.</p> <p>4. CARAVEL admits if the elections should cause a change in the Government, he might have a problem of some degree on his hands, explaining that DULLIEN is without a party affiliation, and might very well throw in with the SPD were it in power, since he is above all a weak and opportunistic individual. Short of this event, however, CARAVEL is in his own belief quite secure from DULLIEN's machinations. XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX ...</p> <p>5. For anyone who is still skeptical of CARAVEL's position and lack of esteem in which DULLIEN is held generally, we relate the following anecdote told by CARAVEL to the case officer. He discussed the matter briefly with CARAVEL (so far as is known not with DULLIFN), who agreed it would be to the general advantage of the German Criminal Police. Von LEX therefore got into contact with the better-class illustrated magazine <u>Kristall</u> and arranged for an interview which was published in early 1960... Just prior to the interview, as von LEX informed CARAVEL, von LEX called DULLIEN on the phone, told him about the meeting, and informed DULLIEN that he considered it desirable to include only CARAVEL who had the professional qualifications successfully to cope with the interview, and to exclude DULLIEN. CARAVEL remarked that DULLIEN hastily agreed with von LEX and offered not even the slightest protest, which settled the matter.</p> <p>6. However, this and many similar instances have certainly not endeared CARAVEL to DULLIEN regardless of how CARAVEL might express himself on DULLIEN's competence. It is probable that DULLIEN has indeed sought to establish relationships within the Ministry and within CAMFN as well which might help him if he should get a chance to avenge himself on CARAVEL. It is not likely that he would be very open about it, however, as DULLIEN's position in the Ministry is itself quite shaky, despite the Government's unwillingness to embarrass itself. It might thus be wondered if [] were not possibly serving DULLIFN's purposes, not to mention his own, and how much more he may know than he chose to say.</p>						
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
