1. Information received under date of 1 October 1946 from American Zone, Germany, indicates that following his departure from San Remo in April 1944, Subject worked for Amt VI, RSHA.

2. In April 1945 Subject and two other RSHA personnel, Dr. Emil AUGSBURG and Annemarie BUSCHMANN, cached eight trunks of anti-Komintern files at Ettal Bavaria. At Ettal, Subject was in frequent contact with Polish officers and at the end of August 1945, he and his associates were taken from Ettal by Polish officers in a car. The exact fate of the documents, which AUGSBURG stated before departure were to be placed at the disposal of the Vatican, is unknown. The possibility that they are still at Ettal is being checked, although it is strongly felt that they may have fallen into Polish hands.

3. Subject and AUGSBURG were both reported at Ancona in February 1946, at which time one KERSCHKE, a Polish priest presumably stationed at Ancona, visited Ettal.

4. It is desired that San Remo sources be checked for Subject and the others above-named. Ancona will be checked from this end.

5. USFET and Anzcon, Only: Subject is well-known to the Italian CE who contacted him at the Polish church, San Remo, photographed all of his materials and aided him in retrieving a case of original materials from Warsaw without the knowledge of the Germans, in 1942-43. Unfortunately, all of their copies were destroyed at the moment of the Italian armistice, 8 September 1943.

6. This information was forwarded for local exploitation to San Remo, which reported on 8 February 1946 that Subject had had German passport No. 487, issued at Genoa on 12 August 1943, valid until November 1945, and that he had left San Remo about April 1944 taking with him all his personal possessions, including his anti-Communist files. His last known address was given as AntiKomintern, Berlin, Schoenberg, Badenschstrasse 2.
