1. On 13 November 1961 the undersigned and Mr. [ ] CI/SIC, were briefed concerning the above Subjects by Mr. [ ] CI Staff, and [ ] who was the previous case officer in the matter, later was transferred to NS, but now is temporarily reassigned to [ ] to work on the matter.
2. It should be noted that the following is prepared from the notes taken by the undersigned and there may later be slight differences from formal reports on the matter. However, the following appears to be the basic facts in the current interest in Subjects.
3. Heinz Felfe, aka Heinrich Sanders Felfe, born 18 March 1913, Dresden, Germany, is referred to in CIA communications as Friessen. Hans Max Clemens, referred to in CIA communications as Hoffman, was born 9 February 1902, Dresden, Germany. Both of the above individuals are BND officers.
4. In approximately June 1957 [ ] then in place, furnished by mail a report to the effect that the delegation of BND officers who had visited Washington, D. C. in 1956, contained two KVG agents. The above matter was given consideration by the CI Staff but was not furnished to Gehlen until January 1961 when it was given by [ ] Chief of Station, Germany, to Gehlen on a restricted basis. Gehlen named as one of the possible candidates for the alleged two KVG agents Felfe, who in communications concerning this matter has the code name of WJROZE.
5. After certain checks were made the investigation centered on Felfe and the BND set up a small investigative unit. Prior to January 1961 Felfe had been considered by the CI Staff as a logical candidate for one of the alleged two KVG agents.
6. Surveillance and tech coverage in this matter has, in general, been limited to Felfe but checks have been made on other BND officers. CIA has provided traces to the BND on various individuals and assisted in the surveillance when the individuals of interest were abroad as well as on certain occasions in the Munich area. This assistance included aid in a surreptitious entry into the Felfe residence.

7. According to [redacted], Felte since 1955 has been in BND Headquarters, Munich, involved in Soviet operations and with the position being compared to the Agency position of Chief/CE/SR, but with perhaps a wider range since the BND position has certain security responsibilities.

8. The CIA and the BND have engaged in areas of certain joint operations and in the areas of these operations there has been an exchange of finished intelligence. [redacted] also advised that there has been considerable oral liaison in Headquarters, BND, between CIA and the BND and, occasionally, in CIA facilities. Joint operations have included operations against Soviet installations and Soviet personalities in Cologne and Bonn. According to [redacted] in approximately 1959 to date there have been a number of joint operations of an audio variety against Soviet installations and Soviet personnel. In a number of these Felte has acted as BND coordinator. According to [redacted] the individual best informed concerning the preceding joint operations is [redacted] CIA employee involved in many of the operations. According to [redacted] the only joint audio operations in the last couple of years which did not "abort" was a unilateral operation of which Felte did not become aware.

9. According to [redacted] Felte was also aware of a number of EA cases, including [redacted] also known as [redacted]

10. [redacted] advised that in approximately 1958 Felte started requesting more information on CIA activities against Earlhorst and was briefed by the Berlin Base in Munich concerning some of the Berlin Base activities of this type. Reportedly, Felte showed curiosity at the briefing concerning matters outside the briefing material and showed great interest in information concerning audio and counter-audio measures.

11. As indicated previously, investigation has been concentrated on Felte and naturally included the associates of Felte. This investigation disclosed that he had certain close associates both inside and outside the BND who were former wartime associates of Felte who had been RSHA. Investigation disclosed that one of his closest associates was Hans Max Clemens, who now has the code name of UJDRUM. Clemens is employed in the Index Unit at the Cologne Office of the BND but reportedly has no direct liaison with CIA. This office was set up by the BND to assist in work against Soviet operational targets and has been in operation since 1955. According to [redacted] originally the office had certain direct liaison with this Agency for approximately a year but since that time has not, to his knowledge, had direct liaison.

12. Felte and Clemens worked closely in Berlin operations of the BND with another BND officer from Cologne who has the code name of

UJDRUG. It is the surmise of the CI Staff that these Berlin operations of the above individuals were primarily a pretext for travel to Berlin to meet a Soviet case officer. However, surveillance of the individuals in Berlin prior to 13 August (when wall between East and West Berlin was put up) did not disclose the identity of any Soviet contact. UJDRUG, according to [ ] is a staff BND officer who for a number of years has been involved in a DA case, UJWUJET. This is the case of a German who was a Russian prisoner until 1956, came out, and later committed suicide. UJDRUG was involved in the operations prior to the suicide and allegedly was targeted by the RIE. Certain contacts were made by UJDRUG with the RIE and UJDRUG became a double agent. During the Olympic Games UJDRUG and Felte were in Rome, and now reportedly met their Soviet case officer, or a Soviet case officer.

13. Telephone conversations between Clemens and Felte disclosed allusions to matters which were not made clear during the conversation, leading to the suspicion of an OWL link between Clemens in Cologne and Felte in Munich. This coverage on Clemens in Cologne was arranged through the British, who originally were not given the full story of the investigation being conducted but have now been briefed concerning the entire matter. Tapes of the above telephone conversations were made available to the BND by the British, and investigation by the BND led to the discovery of an OWL link once a week on Saturday between Clemens and Felte. These involved the use of a "one-time pad" and the OWL link disclosed that Felte and Clemens were having difficulty because they were unable to meet their Soviet case officer in Berlin due to the "wall."

14. Approximately a week ago, on a strictly legal basis, Clemens was arrested in Cologne and Felte was arrested in Munich. Clemens broke immediately after his arrest and has reportedly talked extensively. Felte also reportedly is talking about his own activities, and UJDRUG has been questioned but not arrested since the extent of his Soviet espionage activities, if any, has not been established. In addition to Felte and Clemens, one Ivan Max Tibel has also been arrested, and Tibel allegedly worked as a courier for Felte to deliver material just over the line in East Berlin. Tibel is also an old SS friend of Felte but claims that he did not knowingly act as a courier for Felte.

15. [ ] advised that there have been several conversations between Gehlen and Mr. Dulles concerning the matter and that Mr. McCono has also been briefed since he was in Germany when the case broke.

16. According to [ ] Felte has admitted working for the KGB since 1949 and has stated that he recruited Clemens in 1950. Clemens claims that his motivation was that he was a good Socialist who was

offended by the American treatment of him after the end of World War II. By way of interest, available information indicates that Clemens was interrogated in Italy by Shergold, of MI-6, who conducted the interrogation of George Blake. Also of interest is the fact that both Felfe and Clemens entered BND employment in approximately 1949, that Felfe was higher in the BND organization than Clemens, but that Clemens was higher than Felfe in the RSHA organization.
