1. Transmitted under separate cover are copies of the manuscript of the CATRIBE book on the UJDROWSY case which were made from a copy received on loan from <input type="checkbox"/>			
2. The undersigned offers some impressions which he gained from a quick reading of the manuscript and highlights some passages which may be deserving of a second look by the addressees.			
a. In general the manuscript is a reasonably accurate, though of course very superficial, portrayal of the background and essential facts relating to the case. Some aspects are naturally suppressed or de-emphasized, and others are highlighted in more detail. In some cases facts are totally misrepresented, usually for reasons which are obvious.			
b. The SS background of UJDROWSY and his two cohorts is played up, as is the ease with which a faithful servant of the Nazi cause can become a faithful servant of the Communist cause.			
c. The Khoklov and Stashinsky cases, and particularly the latter, are played up considerably with special emphasis on the KGB use of UJDROWSY as an advisor in its counter-propaganda campaign intended to defuse the propaganda

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effects of Stashinsky's impending surfacing in the West.

d. The fact that UJDROWSY worked for the British and the LfV North Rhein Westphalia and offered one of his cohorts as a double agent to those services as well as to the Interior Ministry is mentioned. Those agencies are gently castigated for burying or suppressing this information with the result that it did not come to the attention of CATRIBE (pages 14 and 26).

e. The GRU is responsible for security in the "Army" inside the Soviet Union (page 47).

f. CATRIBE did not know of UJDROWSY's rank and activity in the SD because he presented CATRIBE with falsified documents from the "Document Center." The Soviets had copied some of the documents in the RSHA when they occupied Berlin and falsified others before they found their way into the Allied "Document Center" (page 51). (Comment: It's always been puzzling just how CATRIBE could have been ignorant of this aspect of UJDROWSY's past. It was documented in JKLANCE files by the mid-1950's, and UJDROWSY apparently discussed it openly with POB staffers at that time. He was, however, very interested in determining through JKLANCE just what the Berlin Document Center holdings on him were.)

g. The KGB passed considerable build-up material to CATRIBE through UJDROWSY which was actually accurate information on the MfS (page 66 and others).

h. False information released by "Alfred" through UJDROWSY was recognized by CATRIBE within a few weeks as being false (page 71).

i. UJDROWSY identified "Big Alfred" as Councilor of Embassy Stepanov, assigned to the Soviet Trade Mission in East Berlin (page 102). (Comment: It is not known if this is true or if it was fabricated by CATRIBE. This does not strike a familiar chord in the undersigned's imperfect memory of the various aspects of this case.)

j. Fuhrmann's exposure as a KGB agent through the unerased KGB tape. CATRIBE fully exploits UJDROWSY's role in this (page 107).

k. CATRIBE single-handedly exposed UJDROWSY without outside assistance. Various incidents pointed toward a leak in CATRIBE. Among other reasons, suspicion fell upon UJDROWSY because he was able to buy a country house. Research and analysis was undertaken, and, among others, the old "Lili Marlene" case was dug up and reanalyzed. Suspicions against UJDROWSY grew and finally CATRIBE intercepted and deciphered a KGB radio message to UJDROWSY which finally clinched the case against the latter. Some effort is made to refute reports that CATRIBE had

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outside help in solving this case (pages 162, 166 and others).

1. CATRIBE takes a bit of a swipe at JKLANCE on the [] case. The point is made that UJDROWSY has JKLANCE to thank for the fact that he was not obliged to serve his entire sentence, because in 1961 JKLANCE frivolously recruited and dispatched two innocent and naive students to the Soviet Union to collect military information with the result that they were arrested. The Soviet Union was later able to use them to gain UJDROWSY's release (pages 7 and 207).

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
