

### Gehlen Wins Fight Against TV

MUNICH (AP) — Gen. Reinhard Gehlen, camera-shy former chief of the West German intelligence service, has won a temporary injunction against a television news team he said secretly took films of him.

Gehlen is author of a best-selling book, entitled "The Service," which contends that Martin Bormann, top aide to Adolf Hitler, had been a Soviet spy.

Gehlen's lawyer, Georg Romatka, told a newsman that the television news documentary program "Panorama" has been enjoined from showing the films of Gehlen.

Romatka said that, after Gehlen had refused a Panorama request for an interview, a member of the program's news teams

secretly took films of Gehlen in his home in Munich. The films were shown in a television news program on Nov. 10.

Only published pictures of Gehlen were shown in the program. The program was broadcast on Nov. 10.
