- B. Accomplishments

(1) Publications produced by KEMALY during the past month and cumulative totals appear below:

(2) Four issues of the Deutsche Soldaten Zeitung (German Soldier's Newspaper) (DSZ) were printed during the reporting period. Regular paid subscriptions now number over 1,500. The balance of the weekly output of 22,000 copies is distributed to newsdealers with a small portion sent without obligation to institutions and influential persons. Edition B, appearing as a monthly in 10,000 copies, continues to win support among the members of the VWS/BvW, over 6,000 subscribers for this edition having been gained from members of this veteran's organization during the last month.

(3) Editorially the DSZ continued to press for the return of German prisoners of war, indicting the Soviets for their failure to release over 100,000 positively

identified German prisoners still being held in the Soviet Union. The lead article of the 7 February 1952 edition states "Stalin promised white beds and then made slaves of hundreds of thousands of German war prisoners". Due emphasis was placed on the establishment of the European Defense Community and problems of Western defense. Front page space was devoted to these subjects in each of the four issues. Feature stories covered a wide variety of topics, from modern tanks to the policies of Maternich. Occasionally the DSZ attacks a Western policy, or prods the Bonn Government. Such activity does not compare in scope with the firm anti-Communist stand taken by the paper, but does contribute toward the preservation of its indigenous character and appeal for the German reader.

(4) Approximately 5,000 copies of issues 11 and 12 of Europäische Wehr-Korrespondenz (European Defense Correspondence) (EWK), the weekly military news service, were printed and disseminated to newspapers and periodicals throughout West Germany. In general, the content was military and technical, almost all of the items are factual or objective releases in the field of military science. Other releases, however, deal with recent events in Korea, developments in the Western defense effort, and military history. A subtle pro-Western approach is followed throughout the publication.

(5) Two issues, 3000 copies each, of the Wehrwissenschaftliche Rundschau (Military Science Journal) (WWR) were published during the reporting period. In conjunction with a subscription campaign, 20,000 pamphlets advertising WWR were disseminated to private persons, book shops, libraries, and veteran's organizations, during the latter part of January. Encouraging positive measures for self-defense and stressing the superiority of the West continue as OPC's twin objectives in the support of this publication. Since the magazine purports to be scholarly and objective, it cannot take an outspoken stand on these issues, but argues effectively that integration into Western defense is the only plausible course of action for West Germany.

C. Reaction

In view of the modest promotion campaign, the number of subscriptions received for Edition B of the DSZ is gratifying. The fact that the Soviets confiscated the latest Berlin consignment of the DSZ indicates the effectiveness of the anti-Communist stand taken by the paper.
