HEADQUARTERS ACTION REQUIRED: Guidance as requested in paragraph 2 K below.

1. Synopsis of Developments:

A. ARCAPELIN/1: ARCAPELIN/1 was met four times during the reporting period. As evidenced by items described below, he continued reporting capably on the Ukrainian emigre scene and he was given guidance regarding his role vis-a-vis Ukrainian emigres on MB's target list.

B. ARCAPELIN/2: During the past several months, contacts with ARCAPELIN/2 have been reduced to one per month. He continues to improve his reporting and this month produced what at first appeared to be a lead regarding a new RLS agent; however, further checking indicated the target is an UPSWIDU operational case.

2. Major Developments: The following were considered to be major developments reported during May 1958:

A. UPSWIDU's Col. SCHMALSCHLAGER: The Colonel, described by ARCAPELIN/1 as the "wily old fox", renewed his "social" contacts with ARCAPELIN/1 and left with the latter a recent issue of his news clipping service and his critique of a recently-published book on the CIA. He asked ARCAPELIN/1 for his critical review of both items. (See RONA-34696, dated 3 June 1958.)

B. Konstantin KAPUSTINSKY: From KASHUBA's statements, ARCAPELIN/1 assumes that KAPUSTINSKY has aligned himself with the SB (BANDERA's security group). Details are found in Contact Report #95 which includes a letter, picked up via CIAD, from KAPUSTINSKY to the BANDERAites.

C. Fedir MANCHUR: ARCAPELIN/1 learned that one of his old friends, Fedir MANCHUR, who has been living in the Ukraine and Poland

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SUBJECT: RV WITH ABCAPELIN/1

1. IS-58-86, 19 May 1954, RUMBLE Members in USA: This report, describing activities of RUMBLE members in the USA (where the group is known as OURDP), will be forwarded separately with the ARMENKURY/2 progress report.

2. IS-58-87, 19 May 1956, Kazimierz ZAMORSKI: ABCAPELIN/1 accepted an invitation by Kazimierz ZAMORSKI (DOB: 5 Feb 1914; POB: Kraaiexyn, Poland) to attend a concert several weeks ago by the singer from Warsaw, Wladyslaw FOOG. At the concert, while sitting at ZAMORSKI's table, ABCAPELIN/1 was placed so that he could be observed by an unidentified man, about 40-45 years old, sitting in the company of two older men at an adjacent table. ABCAPELIN/1 noted they looked at him continually and appeared to whisper among themselves about him. The young man, the only one at the gathering who smoked a pipe, approached a man at another table and during their conversation the young man pointed to ABCAPELIN/1 who figured that one of the men knew him from the old days in the Ukraine. During intermission, the young man motioned ZAMORSKI to join him. ABCAPELIN/1 caught the following bits of their conversation which lasted about 10 minutes:

Z: Let him be peace - I know what I am doing.

MAN: There is no doubt that he is the one.

Z: I invited him.

MAN: Good. You will be held accountable.

ZAMORSKI returned to ABCAPELIN/1's table as red as a beet and was completely agitated. Since ZAMORSKI was aware that ABCAPELIN/1 knew what was going on, he said, "Look, A/1, the man with whom I spoke said their female escorts were very interested in you and asked if I would introduce you to them. But I told them that you would not be interested in older women and that you like younger girls". It was evident to ABCAPELIN/1 that ZAMORSKI was covering up. After the concert ZAMORSKI immediately proposed that he and ABCAPELIN/1 leave instead of attending the dance; ABCAPELIN/1 felt this was another move made to avoid his meeting the other man. The next day, ZAMORSKI asked ABCAPELIN/2 what ABCAPELIN/1 did before and during WWII. ABCAPELIN/2 replied that ABCAPELIN/1 was engaged in politics the entire time. ZAMORSKI asked no further questions of ABCAPELIN/2.

A. ABCAPELIN/1 feels there is no doubt that one of the men or women was employed with the Abwehr during WWII and perhaps recognized

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ABCAPELIN/1 as being a former American agent who is afraid the KGB will dis-
tuted themselves in the KGB's interest because they may have
suspected that ABCAPELIN/1 was working for the American and Polish Section
and therefore the committee that ZAMORSKI would be held accountable. He
feels it was for ZOS's benefit ZAMORSKI is obliged to approach ABCAPE-
LIN/2 for further data on ABCAPELIN/1. ABCAPELIN/1 feels that the Pole
could only have known ABCAPELIN/1 in Hamilton since it was the only place
in the East that ABCAPELIN/1 ever wore a beard as he does now. He feels
that this incident may be clarified when he is in ZAMORSKI's company in
the future.

3. LS-58-88, 22 May 1958, Volodymyr STAKHIV vis-a-vis Ivan MAYSTRENKO:
Recently ABCAPELIN/1 reported that Volodymyr STAKHIV (DOB: 7 Nov 1910)
and Ivan KOSHELIVETS (DOB: 10 Nov 1907, POB: Nizhnia, Russia) agreed in
principle to have Ivan MAYSTRENKO (DOB: 28 Aug 1899; POB: Poltava,
Ukraine) return to work with Suchasna Ukrayina as Journalist and that
MAYSTRENKO wanted to speak personally with Mykola LEBED on this topic.
The LEBED-MAYSTRENKO talk, originally scheduled for 8 May 1958, appar-
ently was postponed till circa 2 May 1958. On 21 May 1958, ABCAPELIN/1
asked LEBED if it was true that MAYSTRENKO wants to be re-engaged at
Suchasna Ukrayina. LEBED confirmed this and said that MAYSTRENKO has
been corresponding with him about it. However, LEBED sent MAYSTRENKO
to STAKHIV who informed Dr. Ivan HRYNIOCH about it. HRYNIOCH took the
position he would consent to re-employ MAYSTRENKO but the latter would
first have to make a public retraction of statements he published against
ZFUHRV earlier. STAKHIV, according to LEBED, has taken the position of
being completely against MAYSTRENKO.

A. ABCAPELIN/1 sees it is clear that STAKHIV is playing a double
role: Before LEBED he is against MAYSTRENKO and behind LEBED's back he
is pushing for MAYSTRENKO's reassignment, that is if LEBED supports MAY-
STRENKO, i.e., STAKHIV appears to be in favor of rehiring MAYSTRENKO but
handles himself in a way as to keep things in his favor all the way
around. ABCAPELIN/1 explained that STAKHIV also handles himself in
this manner as regards the newspaper's policies. When KOSHELIVETS
wrote an anti-Catholic article, STAKHIV Okay'd it; however, he washed
his hands of it when the article received criticism from Catholic cir-
cles, saying that the article was published without his knowledge dur-
ing his absence. His handling of the MAYSTRENKO affair runs parallel
to the KOSHELIVETS affair, i.e., he wants MAYSTRENKO to work but knows
that the newspaper will be attacked once MAYSTRENKO is on the payroll
and STAKHIV wants LEBED to take the blame.

4. LS-58-89, 22 May 1958, Varvara LUKTYANOVYCH (DOB: 15 Feb 1892;
POB: Sosniza Volyn'ska, Poland): Again Varvara LUKTYANOVYCH made her
annual visit to this area and asked ABCAPELIN/1 to conduct requiem ser-
vices at the grave of her husband in Augsburg. She came this year again

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
