1. Additional information on Giordano's relations with BROADWAY is hereby forwarded.

2. Giordano was first connected with BROADWAY after his release from interrogation Camp in August 1946. On his release he was requested by FSS 93 to report twice monthly to Lüneberg for his instructions. According to Giordano, BROADWAY Headquarters had evidently requested that he be put on ice for some future action. Giordano went to Lüneberg twice monthly, but was never given any instructions. In spring 1947 he wrote a strong letter to FSS 93 breaking the contact and stating that he felt he could do more for the Estonians by being free than by being bound to an unproductive agreement. Giordano had no further contact with BROADWAY until spring of 1950 when he was recontacted while awaiting emigration from Wentorf. On BROADWAY invitation Giordano went to London for one week where he was requested by BROADWAY to collect information on Estonia in Germany. Giordano accepted, but only on a tentative basis as he was then expecting to be able to emigrate to the U.S. in the near future, and BROADWAY was unable or unwilling to assure him of emigration to England. Giordano worked on a regular paid basis at first, spending most of his time interrogating returned German PWs. After two months he concluded that it was impossible to keep an eight-hour office job and continue his interrogating. Having reported this to BROADWAY, he continued his work receiving no salary but being repaid for his expenses. He also monitored Soviet broadcasts for the British using a radio set given him by BROADWAY. By summer of 1951 he had ceased doing any work for BROADWAY. His last contact with them was in August when they requested him to participate in another interrogation. He refused as his agreement with DYCLAIM was pending and his emigration difficulties were occupying all of his free time. His only remaining tie after August was the possession of the radio set which he did not return to BROADWAY until January 1952 when he closed his apartment in Wentorf. His reason for not returning it earlier was that he thought its absence from Wentorf prior to his wife's departure would have been marked on by the other DPs who thought it was Giordano's personal set. Giordano said when he went to the FSS offices he found no one he recognized, and gave the set to an Latvian requesting that notification of its return be forwarded to BROADWAY Headquarters.
