SYNOPSIS:

The INS hearing on the residence status of NICOLAE MALAXA was concluded on 1/2/58. MALAXA found "inadmissible" for residence on 12/17/57, with five days in which to file an appeal.

DETAILS

On July 8, 1957, Mr. VINCENT SCRIANO, Investigator, Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, advised the hearing concerning the residence status of NICOLAE MALAXA had been concluded as of 4:35 p.m., on July 2, 1957.

The defense had sixty days within which to file a brief after which an answering brief would be filed by the government. The Hearing Officer would render his decision after reviewing the entire case.

On December 18, 1957, the New York Herald Tribune carried an item on page 19, captioned "US Orders Romanian Deported". This referred to an announcement by the Immigration and Naturalization Service on December 17, 1957, that NICOLAE MALAXA had been found "inadmissible" after lengthy hearings before a special inquiry officer, AARON I. MALTIN.

It was stated that MALAXA would receive five days in which to file an appeal with the Board of Immigration Appeals in Washington, DC.
