Synopsis:

Subject, a Soviet national employed at the UN Secretariat, NY, NY, departed the US on home leave on 5/25/62. Subject described as employee of 9th Department of First Directorate of the KGB, working among emissaries in US; also works counterintelligence among KGB personnel. On 4/29/62, subject met VOLDEMAR HILFINS, a Latvian immigrant, in Milford, Conn., for a number of hours at which time they talked and exchanged papers in the town park. During April and May, 1962, subject observed in company of other Soviets who have been described as KGB personnel.

DETAILS:

I. RESIDENCE AND EMPLOYMENT

On May 24, 1962, FRANK DE KELLIS, Superintendent, 144-45 41st Avenue, Flushing, New York, advised that the subject and his wife were moving out of their apartment at the above address on May 25, 1962. He related that it was his impression that they were returning to the USSR.

The September 23, 1961 issue of the "Staff of the United Nations Secretariat", noted that VIMALY GULINOV from the USSR, was an employee of the Russian Section, Language and Meetings Service, Office of Conference Services.

During April and May, 1962, the subject was observed by Special Agents of the FBI to enter and leave the United Nations (UN) on a regular basis.

On May 16, 1962, NY T-1 advised that in connection with his employment at the UN Secretariat, the subject was scheduled for home leave from May 26, through September 1, 1962.

II. TRAVEL INFORMATION

On May 17, 1962, NY T-2 furnished information that subject planned to leave the United States on May 25, 1962, via the "SS France". This ship's destination was Southampton, England where he had connecting reservations to London, then to Moscow and back to London. He was to return to the United States on August 21, 1962, from London via British Overseas Corporation Flight 301.

The records of the Visa Office, and Passport Office, Department of State, Washington, D.C., as reviewed

by SA THEODORE C. JOHNSON on April 12, 1962, noted that the subject and his wife VERA M. E., intended to depart the United States for the USSR on leave on May 25, 1962, and return to New York on August 20, 1962.

On May 25, 1962, Special Agents of the FBI observed the subject and his wife aboard the "SS FRANCE". They were assigned Cabin # 304 in the tourist class section. This ship departed New York on May 25, 1962.

Immigration and Naturalization Service, New York City, advised on June 19, 1962, that subject departed the United States at New York, New York, on May 25, 1962, aboard the "SS FRANCE", accompanied by his wife.

III. EMPLOYMENT ON ARRIVAL

During early 1962, NY T-3 advised that subject was then a ~~member~~ (Secretary of State Security of the UN) and was also ~~working~~ was an counterintelligence among ~~the~~ (Military Intelligence of the USSR) personnel. In addition, however, that GULINOV might have agents to observe.

of the business section of Milford, where they again sat down on a park bench for approximately 15 minutes.

After leaving this location, they walked to the railroad overpass on River Street, where they parted at 1:45 PM. Subject then walked to his car, entered it and drove out of the area.

Records of Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), New Haven, Connecticut, as made available by ERNEST J. MURPHY, Supervisor, on May 1, 1962, noted that VALDEMARAS MEDZINS, number All 052 336, resided at 100 Grand Avenue, New Haven, Connecticut, was born June 30, 1901, in Riga, Latvia. He last resided in Germany prior to his arrival in the United States at New York, New York, on April 6, 1957. The records noted that MEDZINS was in the United States as a permanent resident but that he had not applied for United States citizenship. His employment was listed as the National Gypsum Company in New Haven, Connecticut.

V. DAILY ACTIVITY

The following activity of the subject was observed by Special Agents of the FBI unless otherwise indicated:

April 5, 1962

At 8:23 PM, subject and his wife, VALENTINA, were observed in the subject's car at East 67th Street and Park Avenue. They proceeded to the Zabar's Delicatessen 2245 Broadway. They remained in this store from 8:39 to 8:52 PM. They then drove to the Associated Market at 2173 Broadway, where they shopped from 8:54 until 9:45. They then drove to their residence in Flushing and entered it at 10:28 PM.

April 19, 1962

At 1:29 PM, subject, accompanied by MIKHAIL T. MENZHULIN, was observed in his car at the corner of 68th Street and Madison Avenue. Upon entering the car, they drove to the Soviet Childrens' School, located at 324 West 86th Street, New York City. After parking the car they entered this address at 1:42 PM.

At 1:55 PM, the subject and MENZHULIN, accompanied by their wives, and MENZHULIN's child, exited this address and entered subject's car. They then proceeded in the direction of 90th Street.

During 1962, NY T-3 advised that MIKHAIL MENZHULIN, a Soviet national employed at the Soviet Mission to the UN, was a KGB agent.

May 17, 1962

At 3:46 PM, FEDOR D. KUDASHKIN, HERMAN P. LEVAKOV and the subject were observed coming out of the Soviet Mission to the UN. They walked to the corner of 69th Street and Park Avenue where they entered LEVAKOV's automobile. Then with LEVAKOV driving, they proceeded to the corner of 72nd Street and Fifth Avenue, where they entered Central Park. They proceeded across Central Park via the 72nd Street Concourse. At 4:01 PM the car was stopped on the Concourse midway between Fifth Avenue and Central Park West. Subject left the automobile at this point. The car proceeded on to the UN Garage.

FEDOR D. KUDASHKIN and HERMAN P. LEVAKOV, both Soviet nationals employed at the UN Secretariat, had been described by NY T-4 as KGB agents.

May 24, 1962

At 12:55 PM, subject was observed in the vicinity of the Soviet Mission to the UN driving his car. He proceeded to the Orchard Street area of New York City,

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

On May 4, 1962, FREDERIC J. MILLER, Assistant District Claims Manager, National Grange Mutual Insurance Company, Poughkeepsie, New York, advised SA LOWELL W. BARTON, that file number 0201-26366 indicated that a policy holder, VITALY L. GULYAEV, 630 Park Avenue, who was a translator at the UN, was involved in an automobile accident on Saturday, January 27, 1962, at 6:00 P.M.

He was driving a 1956 Plymouth, New York license 706864. The driver of the other automobile, a Ford Thunderbird, New York license 08039, was ABIDOL E. ROSA, MD, 50-51 39th Place, Queens, New York. The accident occurred as both cars were proceeding east on Queens Boulevard, New York City.

According to MR. MILLER, his company was maintaining contributory negligence by both drivers and was declining payment on the claim.

On May 23, 1962, NY T-1 advised that GULYAEV had told persons at the UN that someone had entered his apartment over the weekend of May 19 and 20, and stolen a camera and slide projector. According to GULYAEV, he related that when he returned home to his apartment, he noticed that the door to his apartment was opened. GULYAEV mentioned that he made a thorough check but stated that he could find nothing else missing. GULYAEV related that he had some trouble with the superintendent of his apartment house who claims that he was breaking his lease by returning home and that GULYAEV owed more than one months security which he had on deposit with the rental office.

U P E S L E J A Arvids b. 15 July 1920 in district Madona, Latvia. Living at DP study center Pinneberg (Hamburg). In 1940 has graduated Daugavpils Teachers Institute. 1940 to 1942 as a teacher in districts Ilukste, Ventspils and in town Daugavpils. Married. Wife Anna nee Ziedina is studying medicine in Riga. With her is their 6 years old daughter. U. has a permanent correspondence with his wife, but as far as it is stated until now, the correspondence has been of strictly personal character. Wife's address: Riga, Brivibas str. (House number unknown). U. has been drafted at the beginning of 1943. After the war has been in captivity in Belgium. After the discharge in DP camp at Geesthacht near Hamburg where there were his parents and brother. Father dyed in November 1946.

U. has excellent financial situation. By clearing up where he received the money it turned out that he receives DM 50,- weekly money order from S. DJLEVSKIS in Wuerzburg, Central DP camp.

DULEVSKIS Stanislavs b. 10 March 1923 in Latvia, Berzpils, married, lives together with his wife and her parents in Wuerzburg, Central DP camp, Bl. 3 room 17. In Latvia has learned at commercial high school and the last courses of technical high school in Riga. Graduated at Wuerzburg high school. Started to study pharmacy, but stopped that soon. For some time has been in the local Latvian students association. In IRO forms as profession stated "Engineer". On Oct. 6, 1948 started to work with IRO Resettlement Office as a clerk with IXth category. From Oct. 1948 to Febr. 1949 received DM 220.- gross, i.e. DM 120.- net monthly. After 1 Febr. 1949 receives DM 133 net monthly. He is the only worker in the family. Before the currency reform made blackmarketing with radio parts, which he purchased in Frankfurt. A longer time, about 1 year has been working in the radio repair shop in camp. According to the expressions of Upesleja he is practically still working on wireless technic (He is ~~III~~ very talented for that and when I visit him we are experimenting all kinds of new theoretical things and tricks".) With UPESLEJA D. has made acquaintances only now in exile. Once for some time D very often went to Aschaffenburg. In the war has been captured by the Russians in East-Russia. From the very beginning has worked as an interpreter for the politruk. Later he has got a travel order on official duty to Berlin, and went to the west sector. In Wuerzburg appeared at the end of 1946. Is regularly partaking at the camp communist meeting that usually are held together with German in some German inn. D. is very secluded man and does not partake at the social life.

Following further U's actions it has been stated that he very often goes to Hamburg where he drops into expensive hotels and has appointments with people. Especially often he meets one German. He meets also the students K. BRAMBATS and G. GULBIS. Is very much interested in "Europe Union" and Latvian Resistance Movement. His mistress Smits Ilga has wanted to repatriate, but has not done it.

Last week U. has appeared in Esslingen where have been talks about accepting of a new Latvian student organization (which member is U.) to the Latvian Student Corporation Association. Before the meeting the official representative of the new corporation had expressed in mutual talks that U. has arrived as a private person on his own initiative. Later, after a talk with U. he changed his expressions and explained that U. at this meeting is an official person. U expressed that from Esslingen he would go to Wuerzburg.

At the last election at the beginning of 1949 with small majority U. was elected the Chairman of the Central Association of Latvian Students in Exile. U has strictly rejected the cooperation of this organization with Latvian Resistance Movement. His eventual supporters in the mentioned organization: J. Gulbis, K. Brambats, V. Midzins, V. Silins, A. Krums, G. Valtore, V. Gertners.

There is a possibility that U. may get a scholarship in England.

U. is talented, speaks Latvian, English, German and Russian, has logical thinking and good argumentator.
