1. Headquarters' files contain no significant information on Subject's earlier operational activity for CIC in addition to that reported in para 1 of reference.

2. A 430th CIC file check, document not identified, which was received in 1956, reads as follows: "Subject has 20 aliases all of which are variations in the spelling of the following names: Ladislav Milan NIZNANSKY, Ludwig MALECKA, Ludwig MALEPKA, Viktor MAIER, Wilhelm MISA, and Wilhelm MICHEL. (B-2) Subject stated that he volunteered for the Czech Army in 1936 and was sent to various officer's training schools. He served as Lieutenant and Captain from 1938 until 1944, at which time his entire garrison deserted to the Partisans to fight against the Germans. Subject was captured by the Germans in December 1944, lost his commission, and became a prisoner of the Russians in May 1945. Re-appointed as a Staff Captain in the Czech Army in October 1945, subject was arrested by the Obranne Bezpecnostni Zpravodajstvi (Military Counter Intelligence) (OBZ) in January 1946. Subsequently subject was released and reinstated in the Czech Army. In early July 1947 subject was called to the Espionage Section of the General Staff in Prague and informed that he was to go to Austria, pose as a deserter and attempt to contact and join emigre groups to determine the amount of aid given to the groups by US agencies. When he reached Vienna, subject contacted an Allied Intelligence Agency, and revealed that he had been sent to Austria by the Czech Intell. Service (CIS) for the purpose of obtaining information. Subject was then employed by an Allied agency. A known CIS agent alleged that he was a friend of subject and that subject's parents still resided in the CSR. (C-3) In January 1953 subject was given a polygraph examination which tended to indicate that possibly he was withholding information. (Unevaluated) In August 1955 subject applied for USCP assistant. (B-2)"
