ACTION REQUIRED - REFERENCES

1. The following is a study by the RFE Security Officer of some of the potential security risks on RFE Czech employees. Most of the information contained herein is based on "raw" investigative data and much of it is uncorroborated. All cases are under continuous review and where terminations are possible such actions are taken.

A. Identity A has a drinking problem. Known to have talked to two Czech regime officials (topics unknown) while heavily intoxicated at Oberhausen, West Germany film festival. Also intoxicated while on RFE assignment in Stockholm. Known to have told Czech official in 1966 that he was unhappy at RFE and could assist Czechs in improving distribution of Czech films in the West. A German citizen, he may be passing RFE materials to Germans and possibly Czechs.

B. Identity B is a heavy gambler, frequent traveler outside Germany, and has a large circle of female friends. He asked another Czech Desk employee what he would do if approached by Czech regime to cooperate with Prague. He was a close friend of Identity C who committed suicide in 1964 after it was learned that he was working with the regime. Suspected recipient of agent type postcard greeting from Denmark in late 1966.

C. Identity D is not suspect per se but the recipient of an unusually large number of favors from the regime. One son holds full-time position with Radio Prague while daughter was permitted to go through with a sham marriage to an American in order to leave Czechoslovakia. Has been able to meet both sons on two occasions in Yugoslavia without apparent complications. Kasperek-Bunza-Kolin met in Identity's [RFE] Munich home in 1967 to discuss chances of Kolin extricating Bunza's son from the CSR. Kolin was arrested in the attempt shortly thereafter in Czechoslovakia.

D. Identity E. is active in Slovak separatist activities and vulnerable to the same degree as other Slovaks who may have cooperated with the Nazis during World War II. Subject has a wide circle of friends and receives occasional visitors from Bratislava, including one Frantisek Lednar, a member of the Academy of Science.

E. Identity F is a strong Slovak separatist and once suspected of passing [RFE] material to the late Stefan Lukats, separatist leader in Munich area. Former double agent thinks he saw Subject meeting with the agent's Czech case officer on one occasion.

F. Identity G using [RFE] talent and broadcast material in his Identity H. He could be an unwitting tool of the regime by placing [RFE] in an embarrassing position in printing provocative and inflammatory articles (e.g. writers manifesto). Receives financial assistance from the States for Identity H which he believes comes from [] The West German government has complained about Identity H and its position on the Sudetenland question.

G. Identity I is suspected at one time of passing information on [RFE] or its employees to attackers and critics of the Radio in West Germany and the U.S. Close associate of Identity J who redrafted to the CSR. Might have been tied in with Nazis during German Occupation of Ukraine and Ruthenia which could be pressure for Regime to have him cooperate. Nothing has been said by Regime of his activities during World War II though they are highly suspect.

H. Identity K lived in the same building with Identity G, when latter's apartment was broken into, files stolen, and bogus edition of the paper was published. Examination of apartment suggested that an individual with an unusual gait may have participated in the operation. Subject, a spastic, has an unusual shuffling gait and marks on floors suggested something of this type of involvement. Also known to be inordinately curious about all matters and personalities of his co-workers.

I. Identity L has been visited frequently by his mother from the CSR, usually meeting in small Austrian villages. Suspected of having made copies of some listener mail from the CSR. Admits having asked relatives in the CSR to write fan mail to him at [RFE] to improve standing. May have broken into a fellow employee's file cabinet in late 1965 to get listener mail which had been earlier denied him.

J. Identity M was sentenced to death in absentia in 1962 by Prague for allegedly having served with the Hitler 'Edelweiss' anti-partisan unit in Slovakia during World War II. Also alleged
