1. Subject described his job in the same terms as we had heard it outlined by GUNZE. He is actually a security (GART) reference officer to whom questionable cases are forwarded and who helps decide when a case should be turned over to the UPHILL/GART section for running. He is in constant touch with the various security officers in the UPHILL Positive Ops Detn (it will be recalled that UPHILL has now separated their Detn into "Positive" and "CI" Detn) and who watches over the security of the Detn operations. Subject commented that he felt the Ops Abteilung is better trained and more experienced than the CI Abteilung (from which he recently transferred) and this is particularly true of the Detn Positive Ops people. The reason is that these individuals are running "P-Quellen" (penetration sources) whereas the CI section only had "P-Quellen" as an ultimate target which was never achieved.

2. SCHREITER noted that "Bill," a 17-year old American student, is living with the SCHREITERS and going to the same school as SCHREITER's son. He will return to the U. S. in the spring. SCHREITER described his service in the Austrian Army and his attitudes towards Hitlerism (by implication he was all for the Anschluss).

DR. SCHREITER - In reviewing the charts of the polygraph test on 13 June, SCHIDMER indicated that DR. SCHREITER was of Austrian birth, born 1914, who had been with UPHILL for several years. SCHIDMER described SCHREITER as a 'blase', verbose type who would like to lead one to believe that he had seen and experienced everything in the world and could no longer be misled about anything. He consented to testing but pretended to almost fall asleep during the interview. It was obvious that SCHIDMER did not like the man and considers him somewhat of a transparent phony. At the completion of testing, SCHREITER asked to see the charts and in the words of SCHIDMER: "looked them over carefully, making comments, as though he had been an expert who had seen a thousand tests". It was later discovered at HBS that SCHREITER had been previously t-tested by KUBARK in March, 1953, a fact apparently unknown to SCHIDMER and not disclosed by SCHREITER during his second test. SCHIDMER had not come to any final conclusion in SCHREITER's test but was inclined to give a favorable report of the findings. It was pointed out to SCHIDMER that the man's response to the question dealing the vulnerability to blackmail was not completely clear and should possibly be rechecked at a future date.

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
