INTERNAL SECURITY			
Protection of defense secrets is inevitable, according to National Safety Agency Director KIMURA. At yesterday's Upper House plenary session, KIMURA noted that no country is without a law to protect defense secrets in the event it is exposed to dangers of aggression. But he pointed out that a law to protect National Safety Force weapons procured through MSA would be enough for the time being.			
Then Justice Minister INUKAI and Deputy Prime Minister <u>OGATA</u> joined KIMURA in stating that no unlawful oppression will be exercised on free speech. They declared that censorship is not under consideration. "But in case defense secrets have been scooped by some newspaper, after-the-fact investigation will be made to ferret out how the secrets were divulged," KIMURA said. "News-gatherers will not violate the proposed law if they use common sense," OGATA added.
