I. INTELLIGENCE VALUE

- A. Supply limited amount of information based upon their leading position in Evangelisches Hilfswerk (Protestant Aid Society) and upon their trips through Sovzone on behalf of that organization; also from CALAMUS 3 - some reports about Zeiss, Jena.
- B. Presumably at least CALAMUS 3 and 4 would retain some similar position, while CALAMUS 2 might be somewhat compromised by his close association with CALAMUS 1, who is wanted by the Soviets. A lot of information available to these people, now also available to overt sources, would still come to their attention when present overt sources have to be written off. They may then be of value in the political, economic, and military fields.

II. OPERATIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

 - 1. Protestant Aid Society
 - 2. CALAMUS 2: Occupies two rooms in old-fashioned house off the beaten track, with friends all around him.

CALAMUS 3: Has nice little house for himself, wife, mother-in-law.

CALAMUS 4: Don't know circumstances.
 - 3. "Akademiker". (Intellectuals)
 - 4. Moderate income; CALAMUS 3 seems to be doing better than his colleagues.
 - 5. Christian progressives.
- B. Have long been aware of conspiratorial nature of their contact with us and seem convinced that their continued activity for us may be mutually beneficial. Being mature people, they are not likely to be as much affected by Fall Pastime conditions as some others, especially since they have kept out of the limelight. Through their welfare activities, they may be in good position to act as reception committee, letter drops, couriers, cutouts.

III. TECHNICAL DETAILS CONCERNING RECONTACTING

Might be contacted by phone, letter, direct visit. CALAMUS 2 reacts to phrase, "Ich soll von Eva grüssen" (Eva being his common-law-wife, CALAMUS 1); CALAMUS 3 is addressed as "Doktorchen" and in the familiar "Du"; CALAMUS 4 may be contacted through the other two. Protestant Aid Society in Stuttgart ought to have some ways of checking on these men.

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
