

Duesseldorf, April 10, 1962

Dear Mr. Sunun:

In Mr. Mende's office I met Wali Kajum Han for the first time. It is due to his - as I know now - hypocritical behavior that I trusted him. At that time, and together with Mr. Mende, I did all I could to help him.

However, I have had to find out in the meantime that Kajum Han is a mean intriguer who secretly defamed me in Mr. Mende's presence in order to put himself into a better light. His intrigues also aim at you, Mr. Sunun, because he plans to have you released from the radio station and to get his people in there.

In doing so Kajum Han misuses his authority - bestowed upon him by Mr. Mende - to control the Moslems.

He is trying to convince the Professor that you are a spy of the Reds. According to what he says it is your fault that a great number of Turks retired from active work and that some of them even returned to Communist Russia. He says that your close colleagues ^{among others Berdyaurat,} are extremely questionable individuals.

Since Kajum Han considers you to be the main obstacle on his way towards a speedy career, he is not satisfied with defaming you - he also plans to remove you physically. He will see to it that the Russians are blamed therefor. According to his own statements, he believes that for this plan of his he will be able to win the at least tacit support of some high-ranking persons who trust him.

Dear Mr. Sunun, don't underestimate this danger; it is particularly great since by way of his defamations Kajum Han has succeeded in prejudicing a number of Turks against you.

Read my words carefully.
