Files here contain the following traces on persons listed in paragraph 9 of reference:

1. CZERNIAK, Alexander -

- a. An Alexander TSCHERNIAK (CZERNIAK), born 10 May 1899, residing; Sonneggstr. 27, Zurich has long been suspected by the Swiss police as a Russian agent.
- b. On 18 May 1946 the New York Herald Tribune reported one A. CZERNIK, a Democratic leader of Cracow, as having been one of a group of 16 Poles arrested by the Russians. MFP 8081 of 1 July 1948 reported a TSCHERNIAK, one of the military leaders of the UFA, as having come from the western Ukraine and at the time the principal liaison officer between the Ukraine insurrectionists and Ukrainians in Germany.
- c. MUNI 913, November 25, 1949 requested traces on Mihailo FEDAK, one of whose aliases was given as CZERNIK. FEDAK was born March 1934 in Ropianka, Poland and lived in Ganghofer Siedlung, DP camp Regensburg in 1949.

2. We have no traces on Eugen CZERNIAK.

3. KIJEWSKI, Jan -

- a. Waslaw KIJEWSKI, born 11 June 1916 at Straszyn, Poland, was admitted to the United States as a DP on 9 July 1949. He was a member of the Polish London Army.

4. KRAWCZYK, Jan -

- a. WELA 2473 of 7 June 1949 reported a Lt. KRAWCZYK as head of the UB in Tcew. A PPR member and ardent communist he comes from the Kielce District and is reportedly very brutal. He is described as 1.68m tall; slim build; blond hair; clean shaven; wears glasses, born about 1916.
- b. There are other traces on KRAWCZYK's with the following first names: Leon, Ignacy, Jan, Antonin and Wiktor, none of whom are likely to be identical with the WOP lieutenant 11 166 met.

5. SOZKA, SOCHA -

- a. TAB 747, 12 March 1948, SOCHA is secretary of the Communist Party in Danzig and a UB agent.

6. MALINOWSKI, Zdzislaw -

- a. A Captain MALINOWSKI reported in April 1949 as an RIS case officer in Potsdam. Born about 1909, 1.70m tall, medium build, dark, slightly wavy hair, dark eyes, clean shaven, fresh complexion, small pointed nose, occasionally wears horn-rimmed glasses, speaks fairly comprehensive but broken German.

7. NOWAKOWSKI, Jan -

- a. A Soviet Major NOWAKOWSKI reported as director of factories in Lodz which make Army material and repair Soviet uniforms. MGN 398, NOWAKOWSKI is best friend and collaborator of KRAK, chief of the social resistance in Warsaw during the occupation. NOWAKOWSKI is a member of inspection office of the Polish Socialist Party.

8. BRUKA, Boris -

- a. Born 1 January 1920 in Turits, Poland; head of Central Union of Belorussian Intellectuals; lives 8 E. Hoover Place, Louvain; maintains contact with Nikola ABRANTCHIK (ABRAMCZYK), President of Byelo-Russian Government in exile. Karlsruhe has additional biographical information in MCHA 856 of 8 November 1948.

9. WITORSKI, Michael -

- a. Karlsruhe and MOB files contain all available information on subject. MCHA 9838 and attachment contain complete biographical data and physical description. Other references are MCHA 872, February 1950, MSU 924, 14 August 1946, and MGN 3356, 7 November 1949.

10. Files here contain no traces on the following : BACZEK, BARDYK, BOGDAN-
OVICH, CHERNIAK, Eugen; GISZAK, KAIKO, Nikolai; KANONCHUK, KAPCZ, KONRAD,
KRASOWICKI, Igor; KULIS, Stefan; PACHOLSKI, Edward; RAZUMOVICH. There is no
information on ZHYLIK, Arkady except that furnished by 11 284, which is being
sent by separate memoranda.

11. The Black Cat (Chorny Kot) organization has been reported on at various
times, generally as a loose alliance of bandit groups with little strength as
a controlled movement. Its name is used generically to describe any and all
types of resistance by discontented persons in Byelorussia as well as in the
Ukraine.

12. Enclosed is a copy of a report on the Mielecin Forced Labor Camp. This
report contains a few more details on the camp than those furnished by MONICH.

13. We have been unable to locate any information on the prison in Stargard,
the WOP at Myszkiewicza Str. in Stettin and Now-Linke or the Soviet detachment
in Bokwork. MGL 1580 reports a large kaserna of sixteen three-story buildings
located on Aleja Wojaka Polskiego and occupied by four WOP battalions. This
same report also states that a source identified a border guard unit with the
cover number "1825" at Piotra Skargi Street. MONICH was taken to the "Polsische
Informacja" on this street.
