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OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND COMMENTS

1. Using as springboard RUDKO's earlier comments regarding Jewry among the Ukrainians, [redacted] elicited from RUDKO his knowledgeability about various merchants, lokal owners, etc. As it turned out RUDKO does not appear to be very knowledgeable and he was not given any assignment in this regard.

2. RUDKO, however, volunteered that his field agents have reported a number of emigres who indicated their desire to repatriate to the East and who have turned to RUDKO's organization for advice. [redacted] asked if the AIS was interested in this sort of material. When [redacted] replied affirmatively, RUDKO provided the following data which he can expand on if and when necessary:

A. Yuliya TUTKO, of Ingolstadt; she appears to be widowed and has several children.

B. [redacted] MORHUN, of Landslut; who has a wife (m) and children in the East and who married again in West Germany. MORHUN was influenced to want to return to the Ukraine by virtue of letters he has been receiving from his sister. (m).

3. Lyubomyr ORTYNSKYI wrote RUDKO from Brussels to indicate he will visit RUDKO toward the end of August 1958.

4. RUDKO explained he'd learned via relatives in England that his wife in the Ukraine soon will marry a Pole and will emigrate from the Ukraine to Poland. (NOTE: This is confirmed by a letter, dated 11 July 1958, intercepted, to RUDKO.)

5. RUDKO was asked to be alert for any signs of Alfred VIRSING's presence in Munich and make discreet queries of Hryhoriy NANYAK. RUDKO said that since NANYAK knows VIRSING personally he may be in a position to know some data about VIRSING. (See EGMA-34311, 5 June 1958. During AECASSOWARY/2's recent visit to Munich he appeared to be knowledgeable regarding VIRSING and in fact appeared to be convinced that Alfred VIRSING may still be operating in his WW II role as an RIS agent. Headquarters will be requested to obtain AECASSOWARY/2's detailed information regarding VIRSING.)

6. RUDKO mentioned that Olena YURCHENKO appeared to be trying to get into his better graces. He said there was nothing suspicious about this but felt the AIS should be informed about it. YURCHENKO has been dealing with RUDKO during the past year or so regarding UUARC assistance to Mykola DATSENKO of the Munich area who appears to be unable to obtain suitable employment for reasons of health.

7. RUDKO leaves on the evening of 4 August 1958 with a group of about 45 youth for purposes of a three-week camping trip on the coast of the FREDREP near the North Sea.
