- 2) Letter dated April 25, 1951 to Mr. Elliott Brown, President of E. P. Dutton & Co., Inc., from Otto Shertzer, and
- 3) Letter dated April 29, 1951 from E. P. Dutton & Co., Inc., to this Office.

It is information that Otto Shertzer, who was head of the German Consulate during World War II, is a representative of the German Government and representative of the State Department have requested that we pass on to them any information we may obtain as to his present whereabouts. The letter of April 25, 1951 from Shertzer to Mr. Elliott Brown indicates that Shertzer is or was residing in Spain, and we have so informed the Office Department. It appears from the letter of January 29, 1951 from E. P. Dutton & Co., Inc. to this subject person (a copy of which was forwarded to this Office by E. P. Dutton & Co., Inc. with its letter of April 29) that Mr. E. H. Smith has been acting on behalf of or purporting to represent Shertzer in the United States.

We are sending you this information for whatever use you may wish to make of it.

Our contract for the publication of the book SECRET MISSIONS by Otto Skorzeny is with the French publishing house Flammarion. Naturally we are accountable to them by virtue of the contractual relationship. In the event you have any power of attorney that would supercede this arrangement we will be glad to review them and if found acceptable and in accordance with our requirements we perhaps could make some payments as you suggest. Without these documents we can do nothing.

Dear Mr. President,

I was on a trip, therefore I received your letter from the 23.1.51 directed to my friend Mr. E. W. Smith only now. I assume, that you have no knowledge of the circumstances, which led to the selling of my book from Flammarion to Dutton & Co.-I got the advice from my german lawyer, with whom I talked over the situation, to write to you and to try to come to a friendly agreement with you, which I hope we will. So I will explain the whole situation to you:

My former book-agent Mr. R. Laroye, a belgian national embezzled till June 1950 from my conto at Flammarion over 2000\$ and furthermore he signed contracts he was not entitled to do, without asking beforhand for my permission. For this reason my lawyer Dr. Caemmerer, Karlsruhe, canceled in June 1950 the till then legal contract between Mr. Laroye and myself. In spite of this, Mr. Laroye signed more contracts with Flammarion although he knew it was fraud. So for instance with Destino in Spain and with you, the edition Dutton for U.S.A. When I heard these facts middle of September 1950 I telephoned immediately with Mr. Richehoffer from the Edition Flammarion and explained to him that I was not agreeing to the contracts for the USA and for Spain and that Mr. Laroye, as Mr. Richehoffer knew, had not had the right to sign any more contracts for me. I specially stressed the point, that I had only given my permission for a strong shortening of the original manuscript (800 pages) solely for the french language. I did not at all agree for the translation of the french edition into any other language.

The illegal settlement Flammarion-Dutton means not only an avoidable loss of 25% for me (which I have to pay to Flammarion) but also the exchange, as in future I will only receive not very valuable french francs. In reality Flammarion did even not up till now pay me my share of your advance payment.

In the last time I read several critics of the american edition which all stressed the point, that it is bad and not to understand, that the american edition has been translated from the french. I want to ask you now urgently, if there should be a second edition to close a contract with me personally and to take as a base for the new translation the german edition "Geheimkommando Skorzeny", 420 pages, Hansa Verlag E.P. Toth, Hamburg, or if you like the original manuscript (about 800 pages). I think it will be a better business for you and for me.

Furthermore I ask you urgently to let me know exactly, how the "power of attorney" should be, which you asked for in your letter from January 23th 51. In any case I have the right to dispose

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free in the States of 75% of the american revenues.
To your further information: The film rights in all countries
are only in my hands.-Please let me know if any american news-
paper printed any parts of the books.
Up till now I have not seen your edition. Please send some books
to the later mentioned address.

there I will get your letter in the shortest time.
I hope to get soon a favourable answer from you.
