the commercial treaty talks. He left the Embassy of Germany in January 1953 to work for the Wirtschaft Produkt firm in Frankfurt. As representative for this firm he traveled to Potsdam and, in May 1953, to Frankfurt.

4. AWR Pressing. Was developed and recruited by Kuntz from to give commercial information.

7. Engelmann. As an intelligence agent, apparently good. As a willing agent, he has given no information. After subject was recruited he reported to Germany and left the Embassy of Germany. He later met JIMMIE and told him about his new job. [ ] believes that Subject left the Embassy of Germany not because of his behavior in [ ] (as under Reverend), but because he did not want to work for JIMMIE. The chief operative traveling around Europe assumed that JIMMIE would not press him. However, there is the strong friendship between the two and they have continued to see each other socially. While Subject was in Potsdam he sent JIMMIE a postcard.

8. Wittmann. At first possibly the friendship between Subject and JIMMIE's letter, fear of reprisals.

9. Rechtsweg. JIMMIE first met Subject in 1951. He furnished JIMMIE with commercial information consisting of documents and official notes which JIMMIE was given on a loan basis. He did not give any written reports to JIMMIE. He was also very helpful to JIMMIE in commercial matters. For these services JIMMIE rewarded him with gifts and periodically with money. The information given to JIMMIE concerned Subject to a certain extent and on this basis the AWR decided it was time to recruit Subject. This action was to be taken when SUBSTITUTION went to Potsdam in November 1953 as a member of the West German Commercial Committee. All members of this committee were placed under close surveillance and their quarters in the palace hotel were bugged and telephone monitored. One night during this period Subject and JIMMIE, who was also in Potsdam, for the treaty talks, went to the "Royal" apartment. At this time Subject got highly intoxicated. He was taken to his quarters on the palace hotel where he was given German identification numbers, a watch and a passport. He was then transported to JIMMIE's apartment in the palace hotel. The next morning JIMMIE visited Subject in the apartment and told him that he was to be recruited. Subject was given a passport and there would be no further contact with him until 1954.
