CG 2 and HH 1 independently

1. CG 2 met HÜTTL at Salzburg on February 27. HÜTTL claimed that he had just arrived from INNSBRUCK (CG 2 considers it possible that HÜTTL however came from MUNICH, where he could have met Wolf ROEER).

HÜTTL informed CG 2 that he is in contact with Bonn intelligence, however acting only as an intermediary in arranging new contacts. x)

HÜTTL further stated that Harry MAST had recently been fired by (Dr. Emmerich) OF CZARSKA allegedly upon request by G-Organization for the following reasons:

- a- being on friendly terms with HÜTTL.
- b- working for another US intelligence branch,
- c- having publicly criticized and thereby discredited G-Organization.

In connection therewith HÜTTL mentioned that he felt under obligation to pay to MAST such sums as he had received from G-Organization (approximately AS 5,000. per month, representing a comparatively low-fixed salary plus standard G-remunerations for representation, housing etc.). HÜTTL claimed that he found it difficult to raise the necessary money for MAST.

HÜTTL further stated that by misusing the name of his Nibelungen Verlag and Speck Bücherdienst respectively, a questionnaire had been distributed containing among others the following questions:

- 'Would you stand for a commercial Anschluss of Austria to West Germany'.
- 'What is your opinion on the Occupation in Austria'.
- 'Are you acquainted with members of the Occupation Forces, if so, give names, units, opinion etc.'

HÜTTL claims that he immediately ordered Dr. Otto SCHOTT, manager of Nibelungen Verlag, to forward copies to both, CIC Lins and Upper Austrian Security Director [redacted] where CIC expressed the opinion that [redacted]

 a communist stooge. HEIMANN believes KERNMAYR to be the author. HÜTTL personally alleges that G-Organization had inspired and (r) Kurt WEISSLY (collaborator of OFFICER) had edited the questionnaire.

2. HE L, on March 2, 1952, had a long conversation with Erich KERNMAYR. []

When discussing the Nibelungen questionnaire, KERNMAYR denied authorship, but showed highly amused about the 'excellent joke'.

KERNMAYR stated that he had been informed by Dr. MAEKUS, a physician of Altaluster (a Transylvanian Saxon), who, in turn, was closely acquainted with Harry MAST (MAST held and possibly still holds a position with Linz Volksdeutsche Organisation), that HÜTTL had resumed intelligence activity and was now working for Staatssekretär BLANK's Bonn secret service. In such work HÜTTL is supported by Harry MAST and Dr. Otto SCHOTT, both visit HÜTTL frequently. The Linz office of Nibelungen Verlag is used as a letter drop and meeting place with sub-agents.

KERNMAYR alleged to also have been offered such collaboration with Bonn directly, but to have declined because he was no actual intelligence expert.

KERNMAYR during such conversation informed source that (Mrs) (fn) KHM (or KHN), a former editor with Vienna 'Völkischer Beobachter', now living at GMÜNDEN, collects documentary and other evidence against HÜTTL in connection with his former activity with German SD (mainly in Hungary), his endeavors during the final stage of the war to establish a KALFKAMMUNNER government in Austria and Southern Germany, and HÜTTL's alleged gold treasure ('Himmler-Schatz'). Said Mrs. KHM, according to KERNMAYR, intends to publish articles and a book on such affairs.

3. Source had the impression that KERNMAYR's former friendship had turned to hatred for HÜTTL. KERNMAYR excitedly accused HÜTTL

- a- that he had perfidiously betrayed some of his former comrades (f.i. Adolf RICHMANN, now a fugitive, who had sworn to kill HÜTTL) when acting as witness at the Nuremberg war crime trials;
- b- to have willfully invented the number of 6 million nazi-killed Jews, and thereby having bought World's Jewry protection;
- c- to be closely connected with leading Jews in America and to work for Jewish intelligence;
- d- to have stolen and hidden (somewhere in Salskammergut)

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former SD gold funds;

- e- to intrigue permanently against KERNMAYR and to publish articles with various German papers (i.e. the youth periodical of Sozialistische Reichspartei 'Fanfare') branding KERNMAYR a leftist (especially Socialist) collaborator.

Comments: x) It had been reported (R/03329, October 3, 1951) that HÜTTL's intermediary with Bonn's Colonel HEINZ was Reinhold 9 Widigerstrasse, Munich, a co-editor of 'Deutsch: Soldatenzeitung'. HÜTTL is representative of 'Deutsche Soldatenzeitung' for Austria, a position which he took up after severe competition especially with KERNMAYR. (Colonel) HEINZ seems to be BLANK's intelligence chief.

During the conversation between CG 2 and HÜTTL, the latter had mentioned that he was going to write a rough letter to G personally because of reasons given in para.1, subpara.2.

It seems probable that HÜTTL and KERNMAYR (possibly including G) will give each other considerably derogatory publicity in the near future.

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
