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Al Muthanna CW Facility (Samarra) 33 51N 43 49E	No filled munitions declared. <i>(Iraq indicated that it distributed viable munitions to avoid destruction and to move them closer to areas of potential use. However, UNSCOM inspectors found a considerable number of various defective agent-filled munitions.</i>	UNSCOM found destroyed rockets in Bunker 2. In 1991, Iraq declared 2,500 rockets were in Bunker 2, but later indicated far fewer defective Iran-Iraq-war-era rockets were destroyed. Small numbers of miscellaneous and sometime leaking munitions were found in various parts of the facility. All bulk chemical agent was found intact and was destroyed by Iraq under UNSCOM supervision. ^b
Al Fallujah Forest 33 18N 43 48E	15 Al Husayn alcohol warheads (binary GB/GF) 12 Al Husayn GB/GF warheads	Iraq declared that it unilaterally destroyed the 15 alcohol-filled war heads in mid-1991 at Al Nebai. UNSCOM inspected warhead remnants in 1992. Twelve nerve-agent warheads were shown to UNSCOM in 1991 in a Eucalyptus grove at Al Dujayl (33 49N, 44 15E) and later destroyed at Al Muthanna.
Al Tharthar Ammunition Storage Depot 33 30N 43 43E	9 Al Husayn alcohol warheads (binary GB/GF)	Iraq declared that five of the warheads were unilaterally destroyed in mid-1991 and led UNSCOM to the destruction site at Al Nebai in 1992. Iraq declared that the other four were shown to UNSCOM in 1991 at Al Dujayl and later destroyed at Al Muthanna.
Near Taji Bridge 33 28N 44 16E	4 Al Husayn GB/GF warheads	Iraq claimed these were shown to UNSCOM in 1991 at Dujayl and later destroyed at Al Muthanna.
