Got something for today and a broader topic to chew on that's a couple of days out.	
For today, we're re-evaluating the concerns about a possible Syrian BW program, in addition to the known CW capability. As you know, various published reports by the IC have referred to R&D and a possible capability to make offensive biological agents. In visiting two of Syria's neighbors last week I was told by government officials that the assessment has become more firm – i.e., the consensus holds that that Syria developed at least small quantities of anthrax agent in addition to CW. My question: Does the US IC share that view? And if so, does this affect our calculations about risks going forward? Any comments or context would be greatly appreciated.	
For later: We've been working for several weeks on trying to map out how Russia supplies arms and other goods to its Syrian ally. We've acquired some interesting data that points to specific ports and shipping lines, and a particularly heav flow of supplies to Syria in early 2013. I'd like to be able to share this data confidentially with you or a relevant analyst to see if our findings are consistent with what the agency believes to be true. Any thoughts on whether the agency might be willing/able to accommodate something like that? Even if 'off-the-record?'
