



From the Editor

With a view to activating theoretical discussions of the most important and pressing problems of Soviet military science, and above all of military art, according to the decision of the Minister of Defense of the USSR, Marshal of the Soviet Union R. Ya. Malinovskiy, in addition to the Secret Collection of the Journal "Military Thought" which is being published at present, a <u>Special Collection</u> stamped "Top Secret" is being initiated.

The leading personnel of our Armed Forces, from the troops, military academies, the chief and central directorates, and the General Staff, are invited to write articles for this <u>Collection</u>. Obviously the leading personnel of the Soviet Army and Navy, who have the best theoretical preparation, the greatest practical experience, and the widest horizons, can contribute most to the development of Soviet military theory in the light of the requirements of modern warfare.

This <u>Collection</u> will be sent to a limited circle of officials, from army commander upward according to a special list.

The creation of a new <u>Collection</u> was dictated by the desire to ensure responsible authors of an opportunity to express their ideas, proposals, and critical remarks on all immediate problems of military theory in a more restricted circle, which would be difficult to do in other printed organs.

The <u>Collection</u> should be regarded as a continuing forum for articles, in its way, a military-theoretical conference by correspondence.

The fundamental methodology of articles on the pages of the Collection shuld be sharp, controversial, and forcefully argued formulation of the most vital theoretical problems and a creative discussion of them. Depending on the elaboration and clarity of the various matters discussed, there will be published conclusive articles which we propose to invite the most competent individuals, collectives of creative authors, and, when necessary, official organs, to write.

The most urgent task of our military-theoretical thought is to overcome certain antiquated views, and to scrutinize boldly, on the basis of a feeling for new developments, the changes taking place in military affairs. Such an approach will assure the clear understanding of realistic courses of the further development of Soviet military

science, and vigorous, creative elaboration of pressing, new problems of military art as regards strategy, operational art, and tactics, as well as problems regarding the structure and organization of the Armed Forces and of the development of military equipment.

Military-theoretical thought should look ahead boldly, vigorously pave the way to the new and progressive, refute decisively preconceived points of view, and evaluate critically the experience of the past.

As N. S. Khrushchev emphasized, "Under modern conditions, wars will not be waged as before and they will hardly be comparable to former wars." These new aspects of modern warfare, and their dissimilarity to previous wars, indicate with conclusive force the necessity which has arisen of examining from all aspects the qualitative changes which have occurred in military affairs. It is necessary to define the trends of their further development, to subject to a serious and decisive review the established theoretical viewpoints regarding questions of the conduct of war and military operations of all scales, of training, organization, equipping of the Armed Forces, and the gamut of other similar questions, the understanding of which has been predicated up to now to a significant degree on the experience of the last war.

It is envisaged that the theme of the <u>Collection</u> will be to examine problems relative to the nature of modern warfare, methods and forms of conducting armed combat, the use in it of all modern scientific technical potentialities and means, of the types of Armed Forces individually and in coordination, and the employment of various means of mass destruction.

Particular attention should be paid to the examination of the nature, preparation, and conduct of operations of all types, particularly missile, under the various conditions of the probable theaters of war (TVD), and the strategic, operational, and combat employment of missile large units and units. It is necessary to elaborate on offensive and defensive operations of formations of the ground forces, air forces, the navy, troops of the PVO, and airborne troops, with exposition of those features and peculiarities which the use of the means of mass destruction and the conduct of missile operations inject into modern armed combat.

It is necessary to have an over-all analysis of the problem of modern combat with due regard to that particular influence which will be exerted on it by modern means of combat which will be employed by the higher command in the interest of conducting operations and the war as a whole.

Particularly worthy of serious study and detailed elaboration are the problems of operational and combat support, among others, intelligence, protection of troops from the means of mass destruction, and radio countermeasures.

A large part of the pages of the <u>Collection</u> should be taken up by questions regarding the control of troops throughout all elements and echelons. Problems related to these questions are particularly important because the greater independence of action of strategic groupings in the TVD, operational formations, and tactical large units and units, complicates to a great degree, and gives 'special features to, the control of troops. Also entering into the framework of these questions is elaboration on the best forms of organizing the organs of control in all areas, the methods of their work, equipping and cutfitting, using various means of automation, and problems of planning military operations.

It is very important to analyze as carefully as possible, and to elaborate, problems relative to the organization of the modern Armed Forces rear, of the field army and operational and tactical groupings of troops, from the point of view of maintaining uninterrupted supply to the troops of all necessary support for combat and life under conditions of continuous and powerful action against the rear by the combat means of the enemy; and the related problems of defense and protection of the rear and the coordination of operations in this area between the Armed Forces and civilian organizations. Also belonging to this group of questions is the problem of the preparation of the theaters of war and material reserves of all types and designations.

It is necessary, on the basis of profound analysis of the methods and forms of modern military warfare, to study and develop proposals for the future make-up of the Armed Forces and their organizational structure at all levels, and questions of the organization and methodology of training troops and command cadres.

Great importance may be attributed to proposals for further development of military technology, weapons systems, correlation of various types of weapons, vehicles, and mechanisms, and recommendations for further improvement of the old, and designs of new, models, based on the trends of development of technology.

The editors turn to the readers of the <u>Collection</u>, who should actually be its authors, with the request to participate widely and actively in the work of this publication and to submit articles which pose important problems and which propose realistic solutions.

The <u>Collection</u>, with a volume of 8 to 10 quires, will be issued periodically. In the current year, it is proposed to publish 4-5 issues. In this first issue of the <u>Collection</u> are included articles which are most suited to the goals of this publication, chosen from articles  $\frac{1}{2}$ received previously by the ditors.
