Police Commissioner Michael J. Murphy announced last night the suspension of a patrolman for allegedly accepting "gratuities" from the owners of two coffeehouses in Greenwich Village.

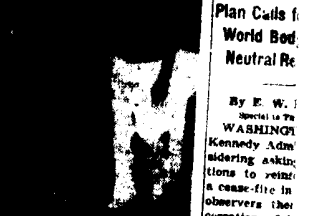

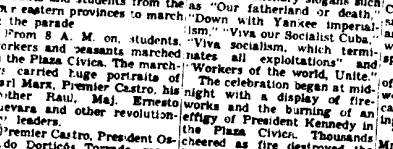

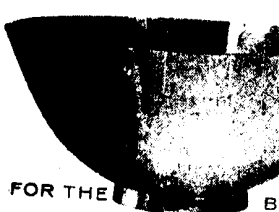
