1. The attached Bureau of the Budget issuance cites Title 44 U.S. Code as authority for the Gift and Exchange Division of the Library of Congress (LC) to collect copies of books, pemphiets, maps, et al. from all Government agencies for gift and exchange purposes. Deputy Director, Geographic and Cartographic Research, during a recent visit to LC had this matter brought and his attention, apparently with the observation that CIA was not complying. He forwarded the attached to the Printing & Photography Division.

2. In view of the position taken by the Office of Legislative Counsel with regard to requirements of the Federal Depository Library Program (noted in the reference), it is unlikely that any action need be taken on this newly surfaced requirement. CIA participation in the Document Expediting (DOCEK) Program was interpreted as sufficient compliance with the code establishing the requirements for the Federal Depository Library Program. It should also fit in this case, especially as the DOCEK Program is administered by the Gift and Exchange Division of LC.

3. Mr. Eisenbeiss, Director, Central Reference Service, brought this to my attention and concurs in this interpretation. also concurs.

SUBJECT: Agency publications required by the Library of Congress

1. <u>Purpose</u>. This Bulletin invites agency attention to statutory provisions requiring that copies of certain Government publications be supplied to the Library of Congress for official use and for international exchange.

2. <u>Background</u>. The Librarian of Congress has advised that the Library of Congress is not receiving copies of all required Government publications. He has requested that agencies provide the Library of Congress with copies of Government publications produced by authorized departmental and field printing plants and those procured commercially, pursuant to the provisions of law set forth in Sections 139 and 139a of Title 44, United States Code. A listing of the authorized departmental and field printing plants may be found in the Government Printing and Binding Regulations published by the Joint Committee on Printing of the Congress.

3. <u>Publications required</u>. The Library of Congress needs four copies of each book, pamphlet, manual, journal, <u>map</u> and <u>chart</u>, <u>magazine</u>, periodical, report, study, poster, and regulation; opinion, and decision of Federal agencies <u>having intra-agency or extra-agency signi-</u> ficance, which is printed or otherwise produced by agency printing plants or procured commercially as contract field printing, including microforms.

4. <u>Exclusions</u>. The statutory provisions referred to in paragraph 2 do not apply to confidential matter, blank forms, and circular letters not of a public character. In addition, the Library of Congress does not wish to receive drawings and specifications of individual patents, daily weather maps, Federal and military standards and specifications, press releases, routine administrative directives, reprints of articles from trade periodicals and books, or announcements of meetings and programs. Copies of publications produced by the Government Printing Office in Washington or at its Field Service Offices and publications procured by agencies on waiver by the Government Printing Office are furnished currently by the Government Printing Office. Arrangements to receive these publications directly have been made by the Library of Congress with the Government Printing Office and they are therefore not within the scope of this Bulletin.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives may order the reprinting in a number not exceeding one thousand copies of any pending bill or resolution, or any public law not exceeding fifty pages, or any report from any committee or congressional commission on pending legration not accompanied by testimony or exhibits or other appendices and not exceeding fifty pages. when the supply shall have been exhausted. The Public Printer shall require each requisition for reprinting to cite the specific authority of law for its execution. (Jan. 12, 1895, ch. 23, § 2, 28 Stat. 601; Mar. 1, 1907, ch. 2284, § 1, 34 Stat. 1012.)

1133. Senate and House documents and reports for Department of State.

The Public Printer is authorized and directed to print, in addition to the usual number, and lurnish the Department of State with twenty copies of each Senate and House of Representative documont and report. (Feb. 7, 1896, No. 14, 29 Stat. 453.)

§ 159a. International exchange of Government publications.

For the purpose of more fully carrying into effect the provisions of the convention concluded at Brussels on March 15, 1886, and proclaimed by the President of the United States on January 15, 1889, there shall be supplied to the Library of Congress not to exceed one hundred and twenty-five copies each of all Government publications, including the daily and bound copies of the Congressional Record, for distribution, through the Smithsonian Institution, to such foreign governments as may agree to send to the United States similar publications of their governments for delivery to the Library of Congress. (Mar. 2, 1901. No. 16. \$ 3. 31 Stat. 1465. Mar. 3. 1925. ch. 421, § 7, 43 Stat. 1106; June 20, 1936, ch. 630, title IV, § 6, 49 Stat. 1550.)

§ 140. Printing of documents not provided for by law. Either House may order the printing of a docu-

ment not already provided for by law, but only when the same shall be accompanied by an estimate from the Public Printer as to the probable cost thereof. Any executive department, bureau, board, or independent office of the Government submitting reports or documents in response to inquiries from Congress shall submit therewith an estimate of the probable cost of printing to the usual number. Nothing in this section relating to estimates shall apply to reports or documents not exceeding fifty pages. (Jan. 12, 1895, ch. 23, § 2, 23 Stat. 601; Mar. 1, 1907. ch. 2284, § 1, 34 Stat. 1013.)

## § 141. Lapse of authority to print, when.

In the printing of any document or report, or any publication authorized by law to be printed, for distribution by Congress, the whole number of copies of which shall not have been ordered within two years from the date of the original order, the authority to print shall lapse, except as orders for subsequent editions may be approved by the Joint Committee on Printing, and then in no instance shall the whole number exceed the number originally authorized by law. (Mar. 1, 1907, ch. 2234, § 5, 34 Stat. 1014.)
