Gentlemen:

Following the many discussions we have had concerning the eligibility of certain employees of the Central Intelligence Agency for membership in the War Agencies Employees Protective Association, and due to the confidential nature of the operation in your agency and the fact that the administrative details are submitted to us in numerical code and also the discretionary factor of selection entirely within your hands, I thought you might like to know that we will be willing to accept in good faith those employees who by the nature of your operation may be called upon to go overseas or are in training for such duties at some future date.

This would probably include a great many eligible employees who have hitherto missed the opportunity of joining W.A.E.P.A. while awaiting actual travel orders.

There is one other item I should like to call to your attention, that is, in the medical selection of these potential applicants should you have a question of their acceptability due to some obvious exception, we should be very glad to receive a copy of the application submitted anonymously or as John Doe, Mr. X, etc., and we shall immediately pass upon the acceptability. Due to your long experience in the insurance underwriting field we feel confident that you will be able to pass correctly on the great bulk of applications submitted but as you know our underwriter occasionally asks for a review where there is a notable exception.

This should open up a new field of opportunity for many of your employees for there is no contract offered anywhere giving the coverage that W.A.E.P.A. does at any cost.
