- c/ In Soviet price relationships, i.e., in rubles, estimated Soviet military expenditures for the period 1950-62 absorb a relatively constant proportion -- about one-seventh -- of GNP.
- d/ Includes procurement programs for major items of equipment with associated initial spare parts as follows:
 - Ground Forces -- Tanks, artillery, weapons, ammunition, general purpose vehicles and other unit organizational equipment.
 - Naval Forces -- Outfitted naval vessels, mines, torpedoes and general purpose vehicles.
 - Air Forces -- Military aircraft, aerial bombs, general purpose vehicles and unit organizational equipment.
 - Other -- Guided missiles and associated equipment, radar and communication equipment, military construction, military research and development, nuclear energy.

- f/ Includes military pay and allowances, subsistence, clothing and miscellaneous personnel expenditures.
