Resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Arizona (the Senate concurring):

1. That the members of the Arizona State Legislature, on behalf of all of the people of the State, wish to express their regret at the passing of the Honorable Sam Rayburn, an eminent and distinguished citizen of our Nation. His passing has saddened all of our people but the memory of his achievements shall remain for many years.

2. That the Honorable Wesley Bolla, Secretary of State of Arizona, is directed to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to each of the following: The President of the United States; the President of the U.S. Senate; the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives; the Governor of the State of Texas; the president of the Texas State Senate; and the speaker of the Texas State House of Representatives.

INVESTIGATION OF PROBLEMS CREATED BY FLOW OF ESCAPEES AND REFUGEES FROM COMMUNISTIC TYRANNY

Mr. EASTLAND, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported an original resolution (S. Res. 293) to investigate problems created by flow of escapees and

refugees from communistic tyrannies, which was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration, as follows:

Resolved, That the Committee on the Judiciary, or any duly authorized subcommittee thereof, is authorized under sections 194(a) and 198 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946, as amended, and in accordance with its jurisdictions specified by rule XXV of the Standing Rules of the Senate, to examine, investigate, and make a complete study of any and all matters pertaining to the problems created by the flow of escapees and refugees from Communist tyranny.

Sec. 2. For the purposes of this resolution, the committee from February 1, 1960, to January 31, 1962, inclusive, is authorized (1) to make such expenditures as it deems advisable; (2) to employ on a temporary basis technical, clerical, and other assistants and consultants; Provided, That the minority is authorized to select one person for appointment, and the person so selected shall be appointed and his compensation shall be so fixed that his gross rate shall not be less than \$1,400 but the highest gross rate paid to any other employee; and (3) with the prior consent of the heads of the department or agency concerned and the Committee on Rules and Administration, to utilize the reimbursable services, information, facilities, and personnel of any of the departments or agencies of the Government.

Sec. 3. The committee shall report its findings, together with its recommendations for such legislation as it deems advisable, to the Senate at the earliest practicable date, but not later than January 31, 1962.

Sec. 4. The expenses of the committee, under this resolution, which shall not exceed \$100,000, shall be paid from the contingent fund of the Senate by vouchers approved by the chairman of the committee.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMITTEE ON REDUCTION OF BUDGETARIAL FEDERAL EXPENDITURES—FEDERAL PERSONNEL AND PAY

Mr. BYRD of Virginia. Mr. President, as chairman of the Joint Committee on Reduction of Budgetarial Federal Expenditures, I submit a report on Federal employment and pay for the month of December 1961. In accordance with the practice of several years' standing, I ask unanimous consent to have the report printed in the Record, together with a statement by me.

There being no objection, the report and statement were ordered to be printed in the Record, as follows:

FEDERAL PERSONNEL AND EXECUTIVE SALARIES, DECEMBER AND NOVEMBER 1961, AND PAY, NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER 1961

Information in regarding personnel reports for December 1961 submitted to the Joint Committee on Reduction of Budgetarial Federal Expenditures, is summarized as follows:

Table with 7 columns: Total and major categories, In December numbered, In November numbered, Increase (+) or decrease (-), Pay in December, Pay in November, Increase (+) or decrease (-). Rows include Total, Agencies exclusive of Department of Defense, Inside the United States, and Foreign nationals.

Table I breaks down the above figures on employment and pay by agencies. Table II breaks down the above employment figures to show the number inside the United States by agencies. Table III breaks down the above employment figures to show the number in industrial-type activities by agencies. Table V shows average salaries by agencies not included in tables I, II, III, and IV.
