25X1 1. [] - GLC) Mrs. Stephens, in the office of Senator George D. Aiken (R., Vt.) called concerning an inquiry from an attorney in Vermont. She said this attorney represented a client who desired information on the last address of her husband, whether he was dead or alive. []

25X1 [] I suggested to Mrs. Stephens that she make inquiry as to this individual's whereabouts through the State Department.

25X1 2. [] - GLC) [] called to express an interest in the provisions of the current foreign trade bill as they might effect contracts with foreign publishers under the most favored nation agreement. I told [] I would check on this and be in touch with him.

25X1 3. [] - GLC) Mr. Buarque, in the office of Representative Thomas F. Johnson (D., Md.), called to inquiry about the status of the application of [] (We have had several previous inquiries from Johnson's office on this case.) I advised Buarque that [] application was in process and proceeding favorably and we should have some firm information concerning his application in the next few days.

5. ([redacted] - GLG) Again called William Cannon, Bureau of the Budget, in an effort to get the Bureau's approval of Mr. McCone's letter to the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee concerning the Federal Salary Reform Act of 1962. Cannon said their personnel people were procrastinating on this for some reason but he would attempt to get us an answer as soon as possible.

6. ([redacted] - JGO) Advised by Lt. Colonel Jack Reiter, Air Force Legislative Liaison, that informally concurrence had once again been obtained from Army and Navy components as requested by DOD to the submission of the Speaker letter and DOD letter to the Bureau of the Budget which this office had assisted in preparing about one year ago. As no problem is anticipated at SOB, the amendments to the Missing Persons Act which we have suggested may at long last be going forward to the Congress from DOD.
