STAT 1. [redacted] Talked with Representative Chet Hollifield, Chairman, Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, indicating we had been working with the staff on the question of the Director's appearance. Explained the possibility that the Director's confirmation hearing on the 18th in the morning could possibly go over into the afternoon. On the other hand, Mr. McCone wanted very much to start the briefing for the Agency but was inquiring if they could possibly be put over until the morning of the 19th if the confirmation hearing interferes. Mr. Hollifield said he certainly understood the situation and, of course, the confirmation hearing had priority; therefore, if it appeared the confirmation would go into the afternoon he could shift the Agency's appearance until Friday morning.

Later in the day, I reached George Murphy and advised him of my discussion with Mr. Hollifield. Later in the afternoon, Mr. Conway called in reference to my discussion with Mr. Hollifield and said the matter had been gone over and they were now requesting us to appear at ten o'clock on Friday morning and they would plan to have AEC and DOD do the U. S. aspects on Thursday afternoon. At this time Mr. Conway also asked that I pass on to Mr. McCone an invitation to a reception by the Joint Committee in their new quarters beginning at approximately 4:30 p. m.

STAT 2. [redacted] At Mr. McCone's request, made arrangements for him to see Representative Clarence Cannon at 10:45 on Tuesday, 16 January, following visits with Mr. Vinson and then with Senator Jackson earlier.

STAT 3. [redacted] Railed with Bill Darden, Senate Armed Services Committee, the question of Senator Russell asking questions on specific points which Mr. McCone desired to be covered. Mr. Darden stated he would take this up with the Chairman and let us know if Senator Russell felt he should be the one to ask these questions.

In view of time factors, I talked with William Saltonstall in Senator Leverett Saltonstall's office pointing out the situation and asked if the Senator would be willing to raise these questions if the Chairman did not. Mr. Saltonstall said the Senator would be happy to do this and the four points to be covered have been made available to the Senator.

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
