#### **MISSION HIGHLIGHTS**

Mission C176C, flown over South China on 24 August 1966, provided the second indication of a native modification to the Soviet SA-2 surface-to-air missile system. While south of Canton, the U-2 pilot experienced and reported activation of and observed a missile contrail. Analysis of the mission's photography did not show the missiles, but did reveal the previously unidentified site that fired at the U-2.

One fighter was noted airborne in response to the mission, but it does not appear to have attempted an interception.

#### PHOTOGRAPHY

A preliminary study of the mission photography shows that 77 targets were covered by this mission, including one previously unidentified SAM site, 14 naval installations, 23 military facilities, 19 industrial complexes, 3 electronics sites, 2 airfields, and 15 miscellaneous targets. Thirteen of the 77 targets were on the COMOR listing (see table 2). Figure 3 is included as an example of the mission photography.
