**Name Trouble.**

Similarity in names sometimes causes embarrassment, as when the public confuses John Foster Dulles, secretary of state, with his brother, Allan Dulles, head of the Central Intelligence Agency.

But the most annoying similarity is between Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Democratic senator from Minnesota, and George Humphrey, Republican secretary of the treasury.

"Like most men in public life," Senator Humphrey said in a recent Senate speech, "I must admit I take a second look when I see my name in the newspaper headlines. I am not too happy about picking up my daily paper and reading 'Humphrey Raises Interest Rates,' 'Humphrey Against Tax Reduction,' and 'Humphrey Finds No Urgency in Action to Stop Recession.'"
