Tuesday - 30 April 1968

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1. [redacted] accompanied [redacted] to a briefing of Representative Donald W. Riegle (R., Mich.) on the Soviet posture in the Middle East. The briefing went very well and Riegle appeared to be pleased. See Memorandum for the Record.

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2. [redacted] Spoke with Miss Sandy Jennett, in the Vice President's Senate office, to determine if they had an extra copy of the transcript covering the Vice President's appearance on "Meet the Press" on 28 April. She said that they did not yet have the transcript in hand, but she would call when it is received. [redacted] FBIS, had called requesting a copy of this transcript.

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3. [redacted] Met with Mrs. Susan Waggoner, in the office of Representative John Dellenback (R., Ore.), and gave her suggested draft language on the Agency's no comment policy for the Congressman's use in connection with a statement he is preparing on his efforts to obtain information relating to the Pueblo. See Journal of 24 April. 1968. Mrs. Waggoner on behalf of the Congressman thanked us for our help.

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4. [redacted] Met with Mary Lynn Sigmon, in the office of Representative William L. Scott (R., Va.), on the case of [redacted]. For the present no written reply to Mr. Scott's letter is required. However, Miss Sigmon will be discussing this with the Congressman and we may be contacted again. See Memorandum for the Record.

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5. [redacted] Late in the day checked with Russ Blandford, Hardy Defense Posture Subcommittee staff, who indicated that the Subcommittee's schedule for the Director's briefing tomorrow afternoon is still firm.

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6. [redacted] Senator Jack Miller (R., Iowa) visited Headquarters for breakfast, discussion of his Central and South American trip and briefing on the current Chinese and Vietnam situations. Present from the Agency were [redacted] and [redacted]

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[redacted] In connection with his China interest, Senator Miller noted in passing that he had first met Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and Chairman Mao at a dinner some 20 years ago while serving with the Air Force. The briefings and discussions were relaxed and generally followed the Senator's lead. The Senator was very complimentary of the Agency personnel he had met during his Central and South American trip. He commented specifically on their obvious knowledge and competence, as well as the assistance they provided him, and his personal enjoyment in meeting them. On departure he noted his appreciation for the meeting and briefing and restated his desire to come out for a day of briefings on the Agency.

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7. [redacted] Met with Miss Weiss, in the office of Senator Robert Kennedy, concerning the correspondence relating to [redacted] Miss Weiss advised that the office has since received two more letters from [redacted] After discussion Miss Weiss said they would file the correspondence in their "crank file." No further action by the Agency is desired.

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8. [redacted] Met with Mr. Walter Mote, Senate Rules Committee staff, who relayed a request from [redacted]

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[redacted] for such unclassified maps as might be available for the principal Chinese cities. His current interest relates to Nanking, Peking and Suchow.

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9. [redacted] Talked with Mr. Robert Michaels, House Appropriations Committee staff, furnishing him a brief [redacted] memorandum concerning the Soviet whaler which entered Los Angeles harbor on 18 April. Mr. Lipscomb had asked Mr. Michaels about this and the memorandum satisfied the problem.

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Also gave Mr. Michaels a brief note dated 29 April on an AID/DOD realignment item which also satisfied his purposes.

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10. [redacted] Talked with Boyd Crawford, House Foreign Affairs Committee staff, several times to determine what action Chairman Morgan had taken on the Europe Subcommittee request for an Agency briefing. Mr. Crawford was unable to give me a precise answer but indicated that clearly no response is required from the Agency. He will let me know tomorrow just what action was taken and whether or not Representative Monagan was a part of it so I can respond further to Monagan.

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11. [redacted] Talked with Bill Darden, Senate Armed Services Committee staff, concerning the letter from Senator Russell on our legislation. Mr. Darden indicated the calendar was still very full on the Senate Committee and he thought possibly the best way to proceed would be to have Mr. Philbin go ahead, if we could do it, on the single item of the cost-of-living allowance, and then the Senate Committee could act on it quickly.

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12. [redacted] Advised Representative Charles Bennett that in connection with the [redacted] case the final evaluation of his medical status was decided favorably. Mr. Bennett thanked me for advising him and said he would prefer not to take any further action in his office at this time but would rather wait until we advised him that all steps had been taken and [redacted] was ready to enter on duty. I said we would be happy to notify him at that time. 25X1

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13. [redacted] Messrs. John Warner, R. Jack Smith, [redacted] met with the Director to discuss tomorrow's briefing of the Hardy Subcommittee. The Director recommended shortening the original two hour briefing, perhaps by dropping detailed discussions of individual countries of Eastern Europe and the Middle East.

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14. [redacted] and Mr. Warner talked with Representative Porter Hardy and John Reddan reviewing the proposed briefing for tomorrow. In view of its length, suggestions were made utilizing the outline for determinations in the Director's oral presentation. With minor adjustments, Mr. Hardy agreed that our suggestions appeared to make sense. These were communicated to the Director and [redacted] 25X1

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25X1 15. [] Discussed with the DD/I the problem
of meeting Senator Henry M. Jackson's deadline (4 May) for material
25X1 we are providing for the Senator's "sitrep" speech. At the DD/I's
suggestion, I contacted [] who is pulling the material together
and arranged for him to meet with Dorothy Fosdick at 4:00 P. M. today
in an effort to reduce the scope of the problem so that the deadline could
be met.

25X1 16. [] Advised Bill Darden, Senate Armed
Services Committee staff, of the language which the Agency, along with
NSA and with the cooperation of the Department of Justice, had inserted
in section 2511 of Title III of S. 917, the omnibus "Crime Control and Safe
Streets Act." This bill is scheduled for Senate floor action this week.
Mr. Darden appreciated having this information in the event he should
have a query regarding it. I also alerted him to the problem posed by the
language of section VII of Senator Yarborough's bill (S.1779) and advised
him that we were working with the Senate Labor Committee in an effort
to have this language changed.

25X1 17. [] Advised William Woodruff, Senate
Appropriations Committee staff, of the language which the Agency, along

into this and be in touch with him.

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19. [redacted] At the request of Marian Ball, USIA, I talked with Mr. Tidwell, in the office of Representative Benjamin B. Blackburn, regarding the function of FBIS. Mr. Tidwell was very much interested and requested that the Congressman be placed on the mailing list for the Daily Report. Mr. Tidwell asked that this be sent to his attention.

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1. [redacted] Checked again with the Senate Subcommittee on Criminal Laws and Procedures and was advised that S. 917 was reported by the Committee and the Committee report should be available sometime tomorrow.

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2. [redacted] Obtained from the Senate Labor Committee the transcript from the Yarborough Subcommittee hearing of Friday, 26 April on S. 1779.

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3. [redacted] Hand carried to George Murphy, on the staff of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, a biographic report on certain officials in the British Ministry of Defense.

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4. [redacted] Returned to Scott Cohen, on the staff of Senator Charles Percy, a letter the Senator had received from

[redacted] Advised by Phyllis Seymour, Hardy Defense Posture Subcommittee staff, that Mr. Thomas Blankenship will be the reporter and Mildred Mooney and Nellie Bishop, the transcribers of the Capitol Reporting firm, for the Director's briefing Wednesday afternoon. The Office of Security has been advised.

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25X1 6. [] Met with Mr. Richard Spears, Research
25X1 Assistant to Senator George Murphy, and reviewed with him correspon-
25X1 dence received from [] which forwarded a copy of
the Henry J. Taylor column concerning Agency "surprises". After
discussion Mr. Spears advised that he would respond to []
that the Central Intelligence Agency had been alerted concerning his
interest with a comment that in the Senator's view, Mr. Taylor was
somewhat mixing apples and oranges in his combining dissimilar
attributes of the CIA and the Defense Department. No written response
to the Senator's transmittal note is desired.

25X1 7. [] Received a call from Mr. James
Dillan, Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations staff,
concerning the Radio Havana telephone interview of Stokely Carmichael.
A copy of the interview was forwarded to Mr. Dillan.

25X1 8. [] Met with Senator Miller and
reviewed with him the arrangements for tomorrow's breakfast meeting. 25X1
The Senator is looking forward very much to meeting with us.

9. [] Introduced [] to the following 25X1
persons on the Hill: Dr. Thomas Morgan; Representative Leslie Arends;
Tom Keena, Administrative Assistant to Representative Emilio Daddario;
Representatives Albert Quie and Richard Poff; and Eugene Kinnaly,
Administrative Assistant to Speaker John McCormack. Also Wright Patman.

25X1 10. [] Talked with Dr. Morgan, Chairman,
House Foreign Affairs Committee, advising him of the request from Edna
Kelly through Marian Czarnecki for the Agency to brief the Subcommittee
on Europe on the [] Explained the Director's 25X1
view that he would be happy to brief the full Committee on substantive
intelligence matters as in the past and would respond if questions were
then raised. However, the Director did not feel that he wished to concentrate
a briefing on these two individuals and the effects on relationships between
the countries involved. Dr. Morgan readily grasped the picture and said
it would not be necessary for us to respond and that he would take care of
the matter. He indicated the Committee's schedule was entirely too full to
even consider a general intelligence briefing at this time.

Subsequently, Boyd Crawford was filled in on this discussion.

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11. [redacted] Talked with Representative Richard Poff on S. 917. He was thoroughly familiar with not only its provisions but the current status. It was indicated that the Republican group which had sponsored a more liberal wiretap bill was prepared to buy the current version. I indicated we had an especial interest in the bill and that some language had been tailored for our purposes. He indicated he would be happy to look after our interests on this during House consideration and it was agreed that we would provide him with an aide memoire.

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12. [redacted] Pat Byrne, on behalf of Senator Milton Young, called indicating [redacted] had asked the Senator to ascertain, if he could, the possible waiting period. After checking with [redacted] I advised Pat Byrne that in approximately two weeks we would be in a position to advise [redacted] that he had been tentatively selected or had not been. Thereafter it would be approximately 90 days before the necessary processing could be accomplished.

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1. [redacted] By way of follow up to the contact between the Director and Messrs. Conway and Murphy, on the staff of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, I talked with Murphy and suggested that they visit the Agency for luncheon with the Director on Friday, 3 May. The JCAE will be holding hearings on that date and it was subsequently agreed that they would come to the Agency on Monday, 6 May.

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2. [redacted] Talked with Scott Cohen, on the staff of Senator Charles Percy, about our interest in [redacted]

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staff. [redacted] in the Office of Security has been advised.

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3. [redacted] Talked again with Bob Harris, Counsel for Senator Yarborough's Subcommittee to consider S. 1779. He said today's hearings went well and their future plans are indefinite. With respect to the problems which we have with section VII of the bill, Harris again said he was quite certain that some satisfactory arrangement could be made in rewording this section. We are to be back in touch with him on this. Harris said he did not anticipate that the Subcommittee would meet again for several weeks.

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4. [redacted] Met with Miss Dorothy Fosdick, Staff Director of the Subcommittee on National Security and International Operations. Miss Fosdick advised that although Senator Jackson would not be giving the first address until the weekend of May 11th, he will be doing the draft over the weekend of the 4th. In consequence, it will be most helpful if the world "sitrep" requested yesterday could be completed by Friday evening, 3 May. Office of the DD/I has been advised.

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5. [] Met with Miss Barbara Bengston, Personal Secretary to Senator Jack Miller and finalized the arrangements for the Senator's visit to Headquarters on Tuesday morning. I furnished a map and other instructions requested by Senator Miller.

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6. [] Talked with Colonel Labre Garcia, Hardy Defense Posture Subcommittee, who advised that the reporting firm (Capital) has not designated the reporter for Wednesday's hearing. Colonel Garcia will check the firm again on Monday for designation of the reporter and transcribers to be used.

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7. [] Attempted to see Mr. Richard Spears, Special Research Assistant to Senator George Murphy. Mr. Spears is away until Monday.

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8. [] Arranged with [] for [] to brief Representative Donald Riegle (R., Mich.) on Soviet rearmament of the Middle East at 1600 on 30 April. Mr. Blake, Administrative Assistant to the Congressman, has been informed and confirmed this as a satisfactory time.

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9. [] In response to a request from [] [] NEG TIG/CI, I contacted George Carroll, in the office of the Vice President, and ascertained that [] was a member of the Vice President's staff, who left several months ago, and has no present connection with that office.

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10. [] Attempted to see Chairman Morgan of House Foreign Affairs but learned he had left for Pennsylvania last night. In lieu, talked with Boyd Crawford about the requested Agency briefing of the Europe Subcommittee. Explained the Director's view on this. Crawford agreed that we probably should discuss it with the Chairman and suggested we meet with him at 9:45 on Monday morning, 29 April 1968. Crawford offered, in the meantime, to inform Marian Czarnecki of this development since Czarnecki was the one who called John S. Warner.

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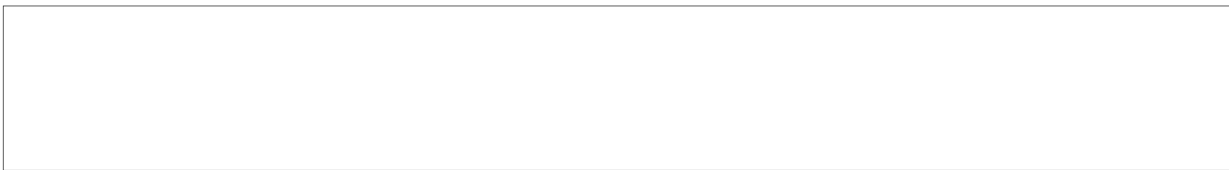
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2. [redacted] Spoke with Miss Dunn, in the office of Representative Paul G. Rogers (D., Fla.), concerning a letter from a constituent, [redacted] about Cuban broadcasts urging Negroes in the United States to revolt. I told Miss Dunn we had been unable to locate the specific item to which the constituent referred, but assured her that FBIS does monitor Radio Havana broadcasts and is well aware of their content. Miss Dunn thanked me for the information.

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3. [redacted] Spoke to Carl Blake, in the office of Representative Donald Riegle (R., Mich.), and informed him that the briefing of Senator Baker had been canceled by the Senator and not rescheduled. It was agreed that this briefing would be left in abeyance pending action by Senator Baker. With respect to a briefing on the Middle East, Blake said Riegle is interested in Soviet armament of the Middle East, not disarmament. I told Blake I would check into the possibility of briefing the Congressman and be back in touch with him.

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4. [redacted] Spoke to Representative Paul Findley (R., Ill.) and provided him further information on the [redacted] article. Although the information was quite general, Findley was satisfied and thanked me for coming by. He said his principal interest stems from his interest in NATO and his desire to strengthen it in any way possible.

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5. [] Spoke to Frank McNamara, Director, House Committee on Un-American Activities, who informed me that the Committee has subpoenaed the records of the bank account of the Black Panther Society. He said he would let me know if there is anything in the account which might be of interest to us.

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6. [] Marian Czarnecki called indicating that the European Subcommittee of House Foreign Affairs would like a briefing at two o'clock on 1 May on the [] matters. I indicated that I foresaw some difficulties on this but I would check into it and advise.

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Subsequently, in discussing this with Boyd Crawford, the Staff Director of the full Committee, he indicated that it was really Representative John Monagan who was pressing for this and the Chairman had previously damped down Edna Kelly, the Chairman of the Subcommittee, on the same matter.

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7. [] Talked with Representative John Monagan about the request for an Agency briefing on the [] matters. He stated he had indeed raised this a few days ago but had not specified that it be an Agency briefing. I indicated we saw some difficulties on this both from a scheduling standpoint and from the standpoint of the subject matter. He said he would like to discuss this further but will be out of town until Tuesday. I promised to be in touch with him on this.

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8. [] Talked with Representative Charles Bennett advising him on the [] case that subsequent to the letter to Bennett from [] on 12 April, we had informed [] telephonically that he had not been formally rejected and that the case was being reevaluated from a medical standpoint with a probable final decision within the next week to ten days. Mr. Bennett was pleased at this and I promised to advise him of the final results.

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9. [redacted] Mrs. Wickram, in the office of Representative Craig Hosmer (R., Calif.), called and said she had a letter from a constituent which she felt might be of interest to the Agency. I recommended that she forward it to the Office of Legislative Counsel and we would take whatever action necessary to follow up.

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10. [redacted] Office of Security, called and alerted us to the fact that the Office of Security is considering part

definite reservations about this kind of arrangement to [redacted] and we are to discuss it further.

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11. [redacted] CA Staff, attended hearings of Senator Yarborough's Subcommittee on S. 1779, Yarborough's bill to support private activities in health education, labor and welfare fields. Later in the day I talked with Bob Harris, Counsel for the Subcommittee. Although the Agency was mentioned in the hearings, these references were in no way hostile or critical. We are planning to obtain a copy of the transcript of the hearing and to continue contacts with Harris on this bill. Hearings resume tomorrow and [redacted] will again attend as an observer.

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12. [redacted] Met with Senator George Smathers and discussed with him in very general terms the phasing out of our activities at JMWAVE Station. I indicated that we plan to retain some use of the area for communications purposes and would still maintain limited capabilities. I told Smathers that our people were in close contact with officials at the University of Miami. Senator Smathers was most pleasant and appreciative for keeping him informed.

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13. [redacted] Advised James Kendall, Counsel for the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee, that our review of the transcript of Navy testimony showed no significant difference with agreed National Estimates.

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14. [redacted] Met with Mr. John Reddan, Staff Director of the Hardy Defense Posture Subcommittee, who advised that the Chairman had confirmed the 1 May date for the Director's appearance.

I also met with Colonel Labre Garcia with regard to security and reporting arrangements for the briefing. Colonel Garcia plans to have the names of the reporter and names of transcribers to be used by Capitol Reporting during the day tomorrow.

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15. [redacted] Met with Miss Dorothy Fosdick, Staff Director of the Senate Subcommittee on National Security and International Operations, in response to her call of last evening. Senator Jackson would like, if possible, a 1968 updated world'sitrep' for his background use. The office of the DDI has been advised.

Wednesday - 24 April 1968

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1. [redacted] Talked to Representative Paul Findley (R., Ill.) concerning the [redacted] in Life magazine. Findley asked certain questions which I was unable to answer and I told him I would look into them and be back in touch with him.

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2. [redacted] Talked to Carl Blake, Administrative Assistant to Representative Donald J. Riegle (R., Mich.), in response to his call. Blake said Riegle had talked to Senator Howard Baker (R., Tenn.) who had informed Riegle that he is to receive a briefing from the Agency which Baker would be happy to have Riegle attend, if it is satisfactory with the Agency. Riegle would also like a briefing on Soviet disarmament moves in the Middle East. I told Blake I would check on both items and be back in touch with him.

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3. [redacted] Talked with Senator Milton Young advising him of the results of the interview of [redacted] with Air America. I indicated that [redacted] made a very favorable impression and he was being put in process and within the four or five month period before [redacted] departs his current assignment it appeared likely that a place would be found for him. I indicated that this should not be regarded as final and no commitment had been made but I was merely indicating that things went very well. The Senator was most appreciative.

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4. [redacted] James Billey, in the office of Senator Milton Young, called inquiring as to the status of one [redacted] [redacted] I said I would look into this and advise.

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5. [] Introduced [] to the following people on the Hill: Representatives Clement Zablocki, Bob Wilson, Ogden Reid, and John Monagan; Mrs. Chet Holifield; John Buckley, in the office of Representative Fascell; William R. Pitts, Office of Minority Whip; Franklin J. Schupp, House Foreign Affairs Committee staff; Margaret Young and Catherine Parham, in the office of Representative Bob Wilson; Carol Tuchmann, in the office of Representative Ogden Reid; and Bob O'Regan, in the office of Representative Fascell.

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25X1 6. [] Received a call from Dorothy Fosdick, Staff Director, Senate Subcommittee on National Security and International Operations, who requested that I come by during the day tomorrow. She has a matter she would like to discuss.

25X1 7. [] I called Mr. John Reddan, Hardy Defense Posture Subcommittee, and advised him that previous commitments precluded the Director's meeting with the Committee on Tuesday, 30 April. Later in the day I met with Mr. Reddan who advised that the Chairman had selected the afternoon of Wednesday, 1 May, for the briefing. Because it will be necessary for the Committee to break at 3:55 P.M., it was suggested that the time be set for 1:30 P.M. to allow at least a few minutes for questions after the Director's presentation.

25X1 8. [] Met with Miss June Nigh, Senior Staff Assistant, House Foreign Affairs Committee, and returned the 2 April transcript of []

25X1 9. [] Met with Miss Barbara Bengston, Personal Secretary to Senator Jack Miller, as a follow up to my meeting of yesterday afternoon with the Senator and advised that Senator Miller will be meeting only with WH and FE people on Tuesday. A later date will be scheduled for Agency briefings and breakfast with the Director.

25X1 10. [] Met with Thad Murray, Administrative Assistant to Representative Porter Hardy. Mr. Murray will keep me advised of Mr. Hardy's plans for a possible visit behind the Iron Curtain during his European trip. At present these plans are quite indefinite. In event of such travel, an offer will be made to provide a security briefing if desired.

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11. [] Accompanied Mr. Bruce Clarke and Mr. Richard Kerr to the Senate Preparedness Subcommittee where they reviewed the testimony of Navy witnesses on the Soviet submarine programs. They found no significant differences between this testimony, insofar as it is related to intelligence information, and the agreed National Estimates. Mr. Kendall, Chief Counsel of the Subcommittee, is being advised to this effect. This action completes all follow up items from the Director's briefing of the Subcommittee on 9 April 1968.

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12. [] Met with Miss Julia Neff, in the office of Senator Spessard L. Holland (D., Fla.), concerning the Senator's letter on behalf of [] for summer employment with the Agency. I explained the limiting factors on the Agency summer employment program, which Miss Neff seemed to fully appreciate. Miss Neff has a copy of our letter to [] and a reply to the Senator's letter is not required.

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13. [] Met with Mrs. Grace Scott and Mary Lynn Sigmon, in the office of Representative William L. Scott (R., Va.), concerning the Congressman's letter to the Director concerning []. Both had only a slight recollection of the case except that it was complicated. I indicated that we were drawing the facts together and that we would be back in touch when this is accomplished. They appreciated the courtesy of this interim report.

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14. [] At his request, met with Representative John Dellenback (R., Oreg.) concerning inquiries he is receiving on the Pueblo. The crewman who died was from his congressional district and an opponent for his congressional seat is beginning to politicize the issue. I told him that the Pueblo was a matter for the Departments of Defense and State and that we were in no way involved in its control or command. This seemed to fully satisfy Dellenback, but for the record he feels he must ultimately show that he has contacted all reasonable sources of information including CIA. I said we understand and if it became necessary to refer to the Agency's no comment policy in a written statement, we would be pleased to work up some draft language for his use and he said he would appreciate this help.

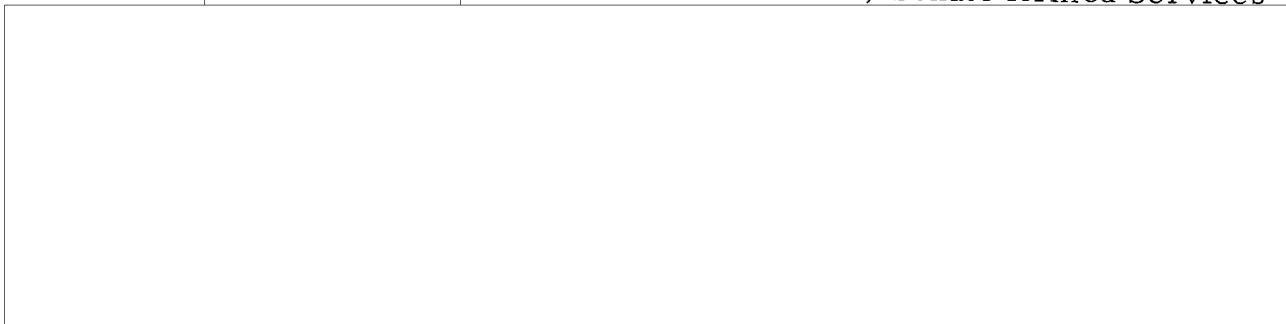

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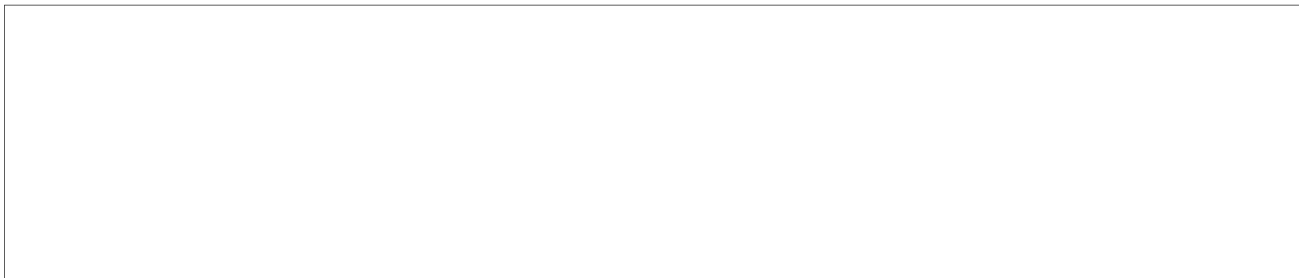

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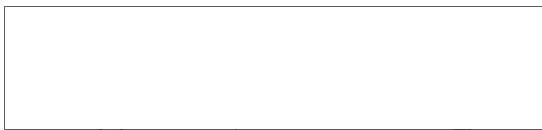

Mr. Bell pointed out that the Committee had passed on these provisions (Title III) and there was no indication that this would be reconsidered. He added, however, that Senator Long was perfectly free to file a minority view and will probably be given an opportunity to do so.

7. [redacted] Charles Kendrick, in the office of Senator Peter Dominick, called concerning further developments in the Colorado State University matter. He said that Todd Martin, of Station KIMN in Denver, has picked up the story on our contact with the University officials and has queried Senators Allott and Dominick as to what action they are taking in the matter. Mr. Kendrick was merely checking with us to see if we had any objection to their making public the text of their response to the University's campus editor. I told Kendrick that as far as we were concerned, this was a communication from the Senators to the editor and the Agency would have no objection to their handling it in any way the Senators' deemed appropriate. Kendrick said he felt the Agency was perfectly justified in what they had done, as their telegram had indicated, and as far as he was concerned they would go ahead and make its contents available. (Mr. Goodwin was advised of these developments.)

Ware also indicated he was going to coordinate with Charles Kendrick, in Senator Dominick's office, since the two Senators wished to be consistent with one another on their responses.

after discussion with [] on the telegrams, that similar ones had been sent to Senators Fulbright, Robert Kennedy, Gruening and McCarthy.

[] Met with Miss Barbara Bengston, Personal Secretary to Senator Jack Miller, who advised that the Senator was late in returning to the city and due to press of business requested that the breakfast at the Agency be put over to Wednesday or Thursday of next week, April 10 or 11. Miss Bengston was apologetic on the Senator's behalf. I assured her we understood the Senator's problem and that I would be back in touch with her during the day tomorrow concerning next week.

It is anticipated that the Chairman will be requesting a briefing from the Director on East Europe, Mediterranean, Near East and Middle East.

11. [redacted] In response to his call, I met with Charles Kendrick, Administrative Assistant to Senator Peter Dominick, concerning the telegram the Senator received from Evan J. Green, editor of a campus newspaper at Colorado State University. The thrust of the telegram was to the effect that "CIA Agents" were utilizing members of the CSU staff for intelligence activities in connection with their travel abroad on AID contracts. This, according to Green, compromised the relationship between the faculty member and AID and degraded the integrity of the University as an institution of higher education. Kendrick seemed to appreciate the situation as far as the Agency was concerned in this type of work but was requesting our guidance in the handling of their response. I advised Kendrick that we were also in touch with Mr. Jack Ware, in the office of Senator Gordon Allott, and gave him the sense of the suggestions which we had made to Ware. Kendrick appreciated our assistance. He said he would discuss this with the Senator and Mr. Ware with a view to making the response consistent with that of Senator Allott.
