

Bradlee Named to Head Newsweek Bureau Here

Benjamin C. Bradlee has been named chief of Newsweek's Washington Bureau according to an announcement yesterday by Osborn Elliott, editor of the magazine.

Bradlee succeeds Kenneth G. Crawford who becomes Newsweek's Washington columnist. Ernest K. Lindley, who has written the column for the past 20 years, is leav-

ing three year as press attache for the United States Embassy in Paris.

He moved to the Washington staff of Newsweek in 1957 and two years later was promoted to assistant bureau manager. From 1948 to 1951, Bradlee was a staff reporter for The Washington Post.

Crawford succeeded Heywood Broun, founder of the American Newspaper Guild, as its president in 1940. He joined Newsweek in 1943 as a war correspondent and was the first United States newsman ashore at Normandy on D-day. He became chief of the Washington Bureau in 1954.
