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**'Inquiry' Into
CIA Marks
Malotte Trial**

A gingerly conducted investigation into the functions here of the super-secret Central Intelligence Agency was carried out yesterday by Leslie C. Gillen, defense attorney in the Mabel Malotte vice trial.

Gillen's inquiry came in an examination that led to the dismissal as a juror of Eleanor M. Rattigan, 2326 Union street, who last week identified herself as a CIA employee.

Gillen pursued the matter yesterday.

A series of exchanges brought out that Miss Rattigan's work did not bring her into contact with law enforcement agencies.

The juror finally ended the questions by saying her office is concerned solely with collection of information regarding foreign countries.

The session yesterday was the first Gillen has attended since the trial started last Thursday. The lawyer, who had been tied up in Reno on another case, gave these hints of what is to come in the alleged madam's case:

1 Mrs. Malotte may not take the witness stand in her own defense;

2 The defense probably will argue that she was arrested through police entrapment, and

3 Testimony in the case might be shocking to the jurors.

Eight veniremen were challenged by Gillen and excused. Four others were dismissed by Superior Judge John B. Molinari for cause. The day ended with a prospective jury of five men and seven women.

Prospective jurors who said they were readers of The Chronicle got a going-over by Gillen. Last week Mrs. Malotte cited an article in The Chronicle's current Police Department series in an unsuccessful attempt to have the trial moved

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
