Groves added that regardless of "whatever extenuating circumstances there may have been, the use of covert means to build democratic institucicly, 'smacking of the meth-ods used in a "closed society." Although the NSA's credibility had been damaged by the exposure of its 15-year financial involvement with the CIA, Groves said, the organization was not going to fold up on either the national or international fronts.

Campus reaction to NSA's decision to terminate its relationship with the CIA had been generally favorable, he reported. None of the 300 universities which are NSA members have yet declared they are pulling out, Groves said.
