The NSA president said rec ords indicated that the CIA first bega npouring funds into he organization i n1952, when 55.494—or 79 percent of the NSA budget—came from CIA conduits.

"NSA WAS exploited be ause it was weak," Groves continued, "To the individuals avolved, a generation of th nost promising student leaders he CIA taught that spying or cllow students overseas, and eing dishonest to close friend and the constitutents at home vas serving their country."

Meanwhile, pledging neve o accept CIA money, Grove and Sterns will recommend that NSA abandon much of its pres ent "cold war involvement" abroad and shift the organiza ion's emphasia to studen problems at home.

"The CIA may have left the NSA but policies which made NSA a CIA front still remain," and SDS spokesman said.

THREE PERSONS who were to have participated in a symposium on NSA-CIA involvement abruptly withdrew, refusing to speak under the SDS banner at the separate meeting.
