

MISS LANSING'S DEATH MOURNED

Governor Harriman Pays
Tribute to Her Interest in
Affairs.

Albany, Dec. 11. — Governor Averell Harriman today joined in expressions of tribute to the late Miss Emma Lansing of Watertown, who died at her home there last night. His message follows:

"It saddens me deeply to learn of Emma Lansing's death. She was an outstanding citizen of Watertown and of our state. She carried a name forever recorded in the history of our nation. Her brother, Robert Lansing, played a unique role as secretary of state under President Wilson during the demanding years from 1915 to 1920.

During the period, President Wilson developed the great concept of the League of Nations, which has led in our time to the establishment of the United Nations and profoundly influenced the nature of the relations between the countries of the new world.

"She carried on and added to the great tradition of her family. Throughout her long life, she took an active and informed interest in the life of her home community and our country, to which she brought a charming personality, a deep human understanding and a capacity for close friendship which made her loved far and wide. My wife and I mourn the loss of a valued friend."
