Accused Slayer Called 'Scapegoat'

Mrs. Oswald Calls

Son CIA Agent

Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, who apparently failed to sway the Warren Commission, set out on her own today to try to prove her slain son innocent of the assassination of President Kennedy.

"I still believe Lee is innocent," she told newsmen after her final session with the commission.

"Yes, I'm saying that Lee was not the killer and was set up to take the blame. I believe my son is a scapegoat."

Mrs. Oswald said she believed her son was an agent of the Central Intelligence Agency.

**PROOF?**

"But who can prove who is a CIA agent?" Mrs. Oswald said.

She said she planned to "make public appearances and investigate if it takes another year to find the President's assassin because I believe he is still at large."

**NO CHANGE**

Chief Justice Earl Warren, chairman of the panel, said Mrs. Oswald had not given the commission any information about the assassination "that would change the picture as we have known it."

Justice Warren said Mrs. Oswald made the same "scapegoat"—CIA claim in testimony before the Commission.

He said the Commission had no evidence from any Government agency to substantiate Mrs. Oswald's belief.

**Ruby Lawyers  
Push Trial Move**

DALLAS, Feb. 13 (UPI)—Jack Ruby's lawyers, confident of victory, today pushed their demands into the fourth day that his trial for the slaying of Lee Harvey Oswald be moved from Dallas.

A running account of witnesses at a change of venue hearing showed 26 felt chances of a "fair trial" would be better away from Dallas. Thirteen testified an impartial jury could be found in Dallas and two were undecided.
