Dr. Peters observed, "It is far more difficult than many Uimagine to secure adequate runds for a crucial and ur gent task.

"And the grander the task the greater the temptation to justify any means which pro vide for its accomplish ment."

Recalling the beginning o World Neighbors as an "hon est, spontaneous expression of concerned individuals for their neighbors in the so called 'underdeveloped arcas,''' Dr. Peters noted "We soon discovered that the task we had undertaken was far more onerous than we had at first assumed.

"And we were assured that the mortgage need never be announced and might never be foreclosed," he added, meaning the CIA funds would remain secret and the intelligence government agency might never call on World Neighbors with a special request.
