Discussions in the Sconcare Defense Conference and with 25X1X7 officers of initiate the need for an appraisal of the effoctiveness of US and international security expert controls and other economic defense measures and an estimate of the effect of possible alternatives. The advent of a new administration is the US may be tax occasion of both congressional and executive review of present policies in this field. The appraisal and estimate should seek to detaining:

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a. The extent to which exceptions due to prior constituents and other special circumstances, clandestine trade, transchiptents, and other evasions of controls have enabled the Soviet Bloc to acquire substantial amounts of strategic materials;

b. The extent to which the present disparity in controls results in loss of export trade of countries with stringer controls to those with weaker controls without accomplishing denial to the Soviet Mice;

c. Whether the joint of diminishing returns may have been reached in CCCOM negotiations;

d. The extent to which the effect of COCCI controls may be offeet by exports of non-participating countries;

e. The extent to which the highly refined definitions and arbitrary "break points" adequately cover the strategic categories;

f. If intelligence as to the Soviet position on various items can be made available with the degree of specificity described by COCOM negotiations;

g. The effect of market fluctuations on the control of exports of producing countries;

h. The effect of increasing sconomic nationalism in Asia and Latin America on the international control and allocation of raw materials;

i. In the concept of a prolonged cold war, the extent to which the Soviets may be able to integrate the scontains of the Satellite countries and achieve self-sufficiency and a cessation of trade with non-Soviet countries; and

j. The extent to which alternative markets and alternative sources of supply may be provided for the present Bast-West trade.

6. It is recommended that D/E be authorized to make a proliminary survey of available information to assess the feasibility of an estimate along the foregoing lines within the time required.

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
