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## CORPISECRETAL

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#### GENERAL

1. Possible Soviet plans for Poland -- IS Ambassador Smith in Moscow believes that the provisions in the new Polish-Soviet economic agreement for the investment of capital equipment by the USSR in Poland and in Polis 1-administered Germany reflect a long-range Kremlin deck ion "never to let go of eastern Germany" and to develop Polend as the first Satellite to be incorporated into the USSR. Smith adds that "if the eastwest cleavage continues and deepens, the absorption of Poland might well take place in the not too remote future."

(CIA Comment: CIA concurs in the belief that the USSR intends to hold eastern Germany and eventually to incorporate the Satellites into the USSR. However, because absorption of Poland would increase anti-Communist opposition and add to the security problem of the USSR, the Kremlin will probably not order such a step until all latent opposition to such a plan has been eliminated.)

### EUROPE

2. FRANCE: Bidault says next 90 days critical -- Foreign Minister Bidault has stressed to US Embassy Paris the critical character of the next 90 days, but he is convinced that "come what may " the Communists will not come to power. He added that continued US support of Schuman would have great influence on the wealthy French bourgeoisie who are now withholding support from the Schuman Government.

Blum's views on French political situation -- Leon Blum has expressed to US Embassy Paris his opinions that: (a) the

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present Government is harmonicus and has a "good chance of muddling through" the immediate vital period; (b) the Communists are trying to meneuver De Gaulle into power before making their own bid for authority; and (c) if De Gaulle returns to power, he would be obliged to "wring the Communists" artic and in so doing would have the overwhelming support of the French people.

Blum also exprensed the "conviction" that the USSI does not have the power and consequently the will to risk war at the present time by intervening in support of the French and Italian Communists.

(CIA Comment: Blum's statement indicates that the possibility of continued difficulties between the Socialists and other parties in the Calmet has been reduced. Cif concurwith Blum's estimate of Communist strategy as well as with Blum's views on De Gaulie's probable course of action against the Communists should the General come to power.

Possible decline in Do Gaulle's rightist support-US Ambassador Caffery has learned from General Cetroux, a leading Gaullist supporter, that Do Gaulle has rejected Catroux' request for Gaullist support of the Schuman Government. De Gaulle's reported view is that the present government will fall shortly, and that any subsequent coalition government will also fall, leaving De Gaulle as the only alternative. Catrou believes that De Gaulle is making a serious error and reports that he has received the impression from various political and military leaders that they share this view.

### NEAR EAST-AFRICA

3. GREECE: <u>Guerrilla usa of subs and planes considered unli end-</u> US Naval Attache Athens--after assessing radar plets, cos rvation reports, and other available date--concludes that there is an real evidence to support continuing rumors that the guerrill is are using submarines and planes. The NA points out that use of submarines and planes requires considerable technical skill and the consequent risk, hitherto avoided, of using non-Greek personnel in Greece.

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4. PALESTINE: Full-scale Anab effort reported for end of Murch --The Counselor of the Le anese Legation has conveyed to Diller bassy London his belief that full-scale Arab operations in Pales tine will start at the end of March instead of early in May is previously planned.

(CIA Comment: CIA believes that Arab n i lary ac ivit is will increase in intensity in the near future but that "full-s sale operations are not likely to get under way until the UK reli gate 193 25X1 the mandate on 15 May - and even then only in these areas that UK troops have already evaduated;

### FAR EAST

5. FRENCH INDOCHINA: Bao Dai to confer with Viets -- US Anbassador Caffery has been informed by a reliable French Foreign Office source that Bao Dhi's present plan is to call a meeting in Hongkong of the leaders of all Vietnam political, religious, and economic groups, including 'even rightist elements' of the Viet Minh, in order to inform these leaders in detail of his ignerment with High Commissioner Bollaert. Source indicated that Bao Dai would also suggest the formation of a provisional givernment which later would invite him to return to Vietram. The Foreign Office official declared that he and Bao Dad were bith uneasy about the success of the plan.

(CIA Comment: CIA believes that support for Bao di in French Indochina is not yet strong enough to insure the success of the above plan.)

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
