I have been in correspondence with both [Redacted] and especially STAT
Matt Baird regarding the possibility of our having a representative of
the Agency participate in our annual Washington Seminar program.

In a letter to me last week, Matt confirmed the possibility of someone
coming to the Fairfax Hotel, where our group will be staying, on the
morning of Tuesday, 19 June, to talk for half an hour or so on the
general role which intelligence activities play in the formulation of

this presentation. Nothing of this sort has ever been a part of our
program in Washington and, as a Consultant to your group, I am keenly
aware of how important the topic is. Having heard Lyman Kirkpatrick
speak, I would feel highly honored if he were free to be with us.
