#### Qadhafi Blames U.S. for Beirut Raid

In the course of a long press conference on 13 May, Libyan leader Mu'ammar Qadhafi accused the United States of unilaterally staging the 10 April 1973 commando raid on Beirut. Qadhafi said that he had information that American troops carried out the raid, and that Israel's only role was to serve as camouflage by claiming responsibility for the operation. Qadhafi further said that if the United States could perpetrate such acts as the Beirut raids, anyone was entitled to do the same thing, particularly the Palestinians.

Qadhafi offered to continue aid to the Black Muslim movement in the United States, and said that Libya would renew its aid to the Muslims after differences over Islam were worked out. He further stated that Libya was in contact with anti-Zionist and anti-Imperialist organizations in the United States, and with their help might be able to escalate the opposition to "Zionism and Imperialism."

Qadhafi reiterated Libya's support for the Palestinian cause and stated that Libya was supplying both money and arms to the fedayeen. He also offered Libyan support to the fedayeen in their struggle with the Lebanese and offered to continue aid to the Irish Republican Army (IRA). (Comment: Qadhafi's statements could encourage increased fedayeen attacks against American targets.) (UNCLASSIFIED)





After an eight-month investigation, Athens police arrested on 20 May the leader and 14 members of a clandestine Greek resistance organization, Greek Anti-Dictatorial Youth (EAN), which has claimed credit for 18 bombings of U.S. vehicles in Greece.
