VIETNAMESE ELECTION

- I. Election of a South Vietnam National Assembly next Sunday (4 March) will complete long-drawn-out preparations to construct a popular base under Premier Diem's regime.
 - A. 123-man body will be elected: its first task-approval of a Diem-drafted constitution.
 - B. Draft(still unpublished) reportedly grants overriding authority to executive—including power to dissolve Assembly in cases of "serious conflict with the government."
- II. Delay in holding elections has been used by Diem regime both to organize new political parties, committed to support of regime, and to hamstring opposition groups.
 - A. Opposition groups, protesting restrictive election regulations, have refused to enter their own lists of candidates.
 - Some individual opposition members have filed as independents, however.
 - B. Apparently as a warning, Diem recently arrested, later released Phan Huy Dan, one of most vocal of opposition leaders.
- III. Meanwhile, South Vietnam government has reduced internal rebellion to lowest level yet achieved.
 - A. Recent negotiated surrender of one of two Hoa Hao rebel commanders, with over 1,000 troops, is important psychological victory for Diem.

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- B. Simultaneously, Vietnamese army has moved into Cao Dai territory, thus virtually eliminating armed threat from that quarter.
- IV. Viet Minh reaction to Assembly elections plans in South has been getting noisier.
 - A. Hanoi radio claims "Vietnamese people" will "transform elections into a bloody reply to the Americans and their lackeys."
 - B. Viet Minh also calling for "massive boycott" of elections but at same time conceding that Diem will undoubtedly win at pells, as he did in the "Bao Dai referendum farce."
- Y. Probable that Yiet Minh will use every means short of overt, traceable interferences to disrupt polling.
 - A. Full capabilities for terrorism and sabotage unlikely to be employed, since appearance of scrupulous compliance with Geneva terms is important to Viet Minh from world propaganda standpoint.
 - B. Communist line is that South, by its "unilateral elections" and refusal to consult on nationwide elections is causing a breakdown of Geneva accord.
 - C. Thus, Communists claim new international conference is required.
