BACKGROUND: EGYPTIAN ELECTIONS

- I. In Egypt, the Nasr regime is holding its first parliamentary elections today (3 July).
 - A. Wearly 1,200 candidates out of 2,500 who applied are being permitted to run for 350 seats in Egypt's new National Assembly.
 - 1. However, 71 candidates, including most of the important figures from the regime's standpoint, are running unopposed, thanks largely to official pressure.
 - 2. Regime found no suitable candidates for 5 seats, which will not be filled.
 - 3. Nasr and his henchmen have not hesitated to make free and arbitrary use of their power to ensure a result over-whelmingly in their favor; they have even casually violated the electoral law they themselves drew up earlier.
 - 4. US Embassy Cairo notes that each former member of the Revolutionary Command Council has an average of 6 relatives running for election. Nasr himself is running several aides and private secretaries in addition to his relatives.
 - 5. As a result, there is little popular interest in the elections, although there have been a few violent encounters between supporters of opposing regime-blessed candidates.
